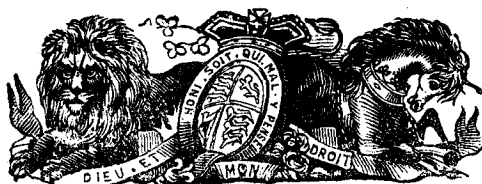

PROCLAMATION

Rescinding the Constitution and Appointment of all the Gold Fields in the Province of Otago, and in lieu thereof constituting and appointing certain Lands in the said Province the "Otago Gold Field."

By His Honor THOMAS DICK, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Otago.

WHEREAS JOHN HYDE HARRIS, Esquire, then Superintendent of the Province of Otago, by virtue and in exercise of the powers delegated to and vested in him in that behalf, did, by Proclamation in *Government Gazette* of the said Province, dated the fifteenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, constitute and appoint all the several territories therein respectively described, to be respectively a Gold Field under the provisions of the "Gold Fields Act, 1862," to be called by the various names therein set forth: And whereas by sundry other proclamations thereafter made, the limits of some of the Gold Fields named and described in the said proclamation of the fifteenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, have been extended and altered, and other Gold Fields have been constituted and appointed in the said Province: And whereas it is expedient to rescind the said Proclamation of the fifteenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, and all other Proclamations thereafter made, either altering or extending the limits of the Gold Fields in the said Proclamation, or constituting and appointing other Gold Fields in the said Province: Now therefore I, Thomas Dick, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Otago, do hereby, in pursuance and exercise of the powers delegated to and vested in me under and by virtue of "The Gold Fields Act, 1866," proclaim and declare that I do rescind the said Proclamation of the fifteenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty three, and all other proclamations thereafter made, whereby the limits of any of the Gold Fields of the said Province may have been extended or altered, and all other Proclama-

tions thereafter made constituting and appointing other Gold Fields in the said Province: And I do hereby further, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority in me vested in this behalf, constitute and appoint all that territory hereinafter described to be a Gold Field under the provisions of the "Gold Fields Act, 1866, and to be called

"Otago Gold Field."

That is to say, all that area comprising four millions eight hundred and eight thousand acres, more or less, situate in the Province of Otago, bounded by a line proceeding from Eyre Peak along the western and northern watershed of the Wakatipu Lake to Fox Peak, thence over Black Peak and Treble Cone and along the watershed east of the Shatover and Arrow rivers, and over Cardrona Mount to the Cardrona river at the junction of boundary creek, thence by boundary creek to its source, thence to and along Kirtleburn to its first feeder, thence to Parkburn at its source, thence along Parkburn to the Clutha river, thence by the Clutha river to Lindisburn, and along Lindisburn to the junction of the Cluden stream, thence by the ranges north of the said Cluden stream through the Dunstan Pass to Mount St. Bathans, thence to the Hawkdun Mountains, and by the Hawkdun Mountains to Mount Ida, thence to Kyeburn Hill, thence along the Kakanui Mountains and the north-eastern boundaries of Runs numbered respectively 255 and 109 to Mount Fortune, thence along the south-eastern boundary of Run 109 to the watershed between the Taieri and Waikouaiti rivers, thence by the Silver Peak Hills to Silver Stream, and by Silver Stream to the northern boundary line of the East Taieri Hundred, thence along the said boundary line to the eastern boundary of Block II, Dunedin and East Taieri District, thence by the said eastern boundary to the road line forming the southern boundary of sections numbered respectively 21, 22, 25, 6, 7, and 8, Block II aforesaid, thence along the said road line to the Taieri river, and by the said river to the Dunstan road, thence by the said Dunstan road and the southern boundary of the

township of Outram to the boundary of the Hundreds, thence by the boundary of the Hundreds to the Tokomairiro river, thence by the said Tokomairiro river until it intersects a direct line from Trig. Station F to Trig. Station E Table Hill District, thence to Trig. Station E aforesaid, thence to Trig. Station D, thence to Trig. Station C, thence to Trig. Station K, all in the Table Hill District aforesaid, thence to Trig. Station L, thence to Trig. Station W, both in Tokomairiro Survey District, thence to Trig. Station V, Hillend District, thence in a direct line towards Trig. Station Z in the same District to the boundary of the Hundreds, thence in a south-westerly direction to Lovell's Creek, thence by Lovell's Creek to the boundary of Run numbered 54, thence by the boundary of the said Run to a point situated north-east of the source of the Crook Burn, thence by a south-westerly line to the source of Crook Burn, thence by Crook Burn to its junction with the Clutha River, thence by the Clutha River to Scrub Burn, thence to a point opposite Scrub Burn, twenty chains distant from the west bank of the Clutha River, thence in a northerly direction and parallel to the Clutha River to Black Cleugh Burn, thence by Black Cleugh Burn and the Tapanui Ranges to a point due east of Spylaw Burn at its source, thence to and along Spylaw Burn, the Pomahaka River, and Parasol Creek, to the Black Umbrella Mountain, thence by the watershed of the Wakaia River to the south boundary of Run numbered 193, thence due west to the Mataura River, and by the Mataura River to the Eyre Peak, the starting point.

Given under my hand at Dunedin, and under the public seal of the Province of Otago, this twenty-ninth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by "The Customs Regulation Act, 1858," it is enacted that the Governor may from time to time by proclamation make provision for the examination of exported gold, not being gold coin, and respecting the mode of packing and securing the same, and may prohibit the exportation thereof, except from specified ports, and generally may regulate and restrict the export of gold other than gold coin, and further, that the Governor may from time to time regulate and restrict the carriage of gold other than gold coin coastwise, from one port of the Colony to another. And whereas by "The Gold Duty Act, 1858," provision is made for levying a duty upon gold exported from New Zealand :

Now therefore, I, Sir George Grey, the Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority so vested in me as aforesaid, do hereby proclaim and declare that no gold other than gold coin shall hereafter be shipped from any part of the said Colony, either for exportation or to be carried coastwise from one port to another in the said Colony, except gold upon which the said export duty in and by "The Gold Duty Act, 1858," aforesaid, authorised to be levied, shall have been duly levied by and paid to the Collector of Customs for the port from which the same gold shall be first shipped;

Provided always that gold upon which the said duty shall have been duly levied and paid on shipment at any port of the said Colony may be landed in the said Colony and again shipped for exportation without any further payment of duty, in the same or different parcels, upon production to the Collector of Customs at the port of re-shipment of a certificate under the hand of the Collector of Customs of the port whence the said gold was originally shipped, of the due payment of the said duty upon the same or an equal amount of gold, and upon every such re-shipment, the Collector of Customs at the port of re-shipment shall cancel the certificate of payment of duty so produced to him, as aforesaid, by writing thereupon his name, the date of such cancellation, and the name of the port to which such gold is so re-shipped.

And I do declare that this proclamation shall come into operation and take effect on the first day of February, 1867.

Given under the hand of His Excellency Sir George Grey, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, at the Government House, at Wellington, and issued under the Seal of the said Colony this eighth day of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

THE following Order of Her Majesty in Council, on the subject of Appeals from the Supreme Court of New Zealand, is re-published for general information.

NEW ZEALAND.

Order in Council to make provision for direct Appeals from the Supreme Court of New Zealand to Her Majesty in Council.

At the Court at Buckingham Palace, the 10th day of May, 1860.

Present :

The Queen's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas by an Ordinance passed by the Governor and Legislative Council of the Colony of New Zealand in the 7th year of Her Majesty's Reign, intituled "Session III, No. I, An Ordinance for establishing a Supreme Court," it was enacted that there should be within the said Colony a Court of Record, called the Supreme Court of New Zealand with the powers and jurisdiction therein specified. And whereas by another Ordinance passed in the tenth year of Her Majesty's reign, and intituled "Session VII, No. III, An Ordinance to Amend an Ordinance for establishing a Supreme Court, and to establish a Court of Appeal," it was enacted that the Governor and Executive Council of the said Colony shall have power to receive appeals from the said Supreme Court, and that subject to the rules therein set forth, appeals might be had from the said Court of Appeal to Her Majesty in Council; but it was provided that nothing therein contained should be construed to affect the power and authority of Her Majesty to admit an appeal to Her Majesty in Council from any judgment either of the said Supreme Court or of the Court of Appeal thereby constituted. And whereas no rules have been made by Her Majesty for admitting such appeals, and doubts have been entertained whether it is competent for a party to any proceeding before the said Supreme Court to appeal directly from a decision of the said Court to Her Majesty in Council. And whereas by an Act passed in a Session of Parliament holden in the seventh and eighth years of Her Majesty, it was enacted that it should be competent for Her Majesty, by any Order or

Orders in Council, to provide for the admission of appeals to Her Majesty in Council from any judgments, sentences, decrees, or orders of any Court of Justice within any British Colony or possession abroad, although such Court should not be a Court of Errors or Appeal within such Colony or possession, and to make provision for the instituting and prosecuting such appeals, and for carrying into effect any such decisions or sentences as Her Majesty in Council shall pronounce thereon: And whereas it is desirable that provision should be made to enable parties to appeal from the decisions of the said Supreme Court to Her Majesty in Council:

It is hereby ordered by the Queen's most excellent Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, that any person or persons may appeal to Her Majesty, Her heirs and successors, in Her or their Privy Council, from any final judgment, decree, order, or sentence of the said Supreme Court of New Zealand, in such manner, within such time, and under and subject to such rules, regulations, and limitations as are hereinafter mentioned; that is to say, in case any such judgment, decree, order, or sentence shall be given or pronounced for or in respect of any sum or matter at issue above the amount or value of five hundred pounds sterling (£500), or in case such judgment decree, order, or sentence shall involve directly or indirectly any claim, demand, or question to, or respecting property, or any civil right amounting to or of the value of five hundred pounds sterling (£500), the person or persons feeling aggrieved by any such judgment decree, order, or sentence may, within fourteen days next after the same shall have been pronounced, made, or given, apply to the said Court by motion or petition for leave to appeal therefrom to Her Majesty, Her heirs and successors, in Her or their Privy Council; and in case such leave to appeal shall be prayed by the party or parties who is or are directed to pay any such sum of money or perform any duty, the said Court shall, and is hereby empowered either to direct that judgment, decree, order, or sentence appealed from shall be carried into execution, or that the execution thereof shall be suspended pending the said appeal, as to the said Court may appear to be most consistent with real and substantial justice; and in case the said Court shall direct such judgment, decree, order, or sentence to be carried into execution, the person or persons in whose favor the same shall be given, shall, before the execution thereof, enter into good and sufficient security to be approved by the said Court for the due performance of such judgments or order as Her Majesty, Her heirs and successors, shall think fit to make thereupon; and in all cases security shall also be given by the party or parties appellant in a bond or mortgage, or personal recognizance, not exceeding the value of five hundred pounds sterling (£500) for the prosecution of the appeal and payment of all such costs as may be awarded by Her Majesty, Her Heirs and successors, or by the Judicial Committee of Her Majesty's Privy Council, to the party or parties respondent: and if such last-mentioned security shall be entered into within three months from the date of such motion or petition for leave to appeal, then, and not otherwise, the said Court shall allow the appeal, and the party or parties appellant shall be at liberty to prefer and prosecute his, her, or their appeals to Her Majesty, Her heirs and successors, in Her or their Privy Council, in such manner, and under such rules as are or may be observed in appeals made to Her Majesty from Her Majesty's colonies and plantations abroad.

And it is further ordered that it shall be lawful for the said Supreme Court of New Zealand, at its discretion, on the petition of any party who considers himself aggrieved by any preliminary or interlocutory judgment, decree, order, or sentence of the said Supreme Court, to grant permission to such party to appeal against the same to Her Majesty, Her heirs and successors, in her or their Privy Council, subject to the same rules, regulations, and limitations as are herein expressed respecting appeals from final judgments, decrees, orders, and sentences:

Provided also, that if in any action, suit, or other proceeding it shall so happen that no final judgment, decree, or sentence can be duly given in consequence of a disagreement of opinion between the Judges of the said Supreme Court, then, and in such case, the final judgment, decree, order, or sentence may be entered *pro forma* on the petition of any of the parties to the action, suit, or other proceedings, according to the opinion of the Chief Justice, or, in his absence, of the senior Puisne Judge of the said Supreme Court; provided that such order, decree, or sentence shall be deemed a judgment, decree, order, or sentence of the Court for the purpose of an appeal against the same, but not for any other purpose.

Provided always, and it is hereby ordered that nothing herein contained doth or shall extend, or be construed to extend, to take away, or abridge, the undoubted right and authority of Her Majesty, Her heirs and successors, upon the humble petition at any time of any person or persons aggrieved by any judgment or determination of the said Court to admit his, her, or their appeal therefrom, upon such terms and upon such securities, limitations, restrictions, and regulations as Her Majesty, Her heirs or successors, shall think fit, and to reverse, correct, or vary such judgment or determination as to Her Majesty, Her heirs and successors, shall seem meet.

And it is further ordered that in all cases of appeal allowed by the said Court or by Her Majesty, Her heirs or successors, the said Court shall certify and transmit to Her Majesty, Her Heirs and successors, in Her or their Privy Council, a true and exact copy of all evidence, proceedings, judgments, decrees, and orders, had or made in such cases appealed, so far as the same have relation to the matters of appeal, such copies to be certified under the seal of the said Court, and that the said Court shall also certify and transmit to Her Majesty, Her heirs and successors, in Her or their Privy Council, a copy of the reasons given by the Judges of such Court, or by any of such Judges for or against the judgment or determination appealed against, where such reasons shall have been given in writing, and where such reasons shall have been given orally, then a statement in writing of the reasons given by the Judges of such Court, or by any of such Judges, for or against the judgment or determination appealed against.

And it is further directed and ordained that the said Court shall, in all cases of appeal to Her Majesty, Her heirs or successors, conform to and execute, or cause to be executed, such judgments and orders as Her Majesty, Her heirs and successors, shall think fit to make in the premises, in such manner as any original judgment, decree, or decretal order, or other order or rule of the said Court of New Zealand should or might have been executed.

And the most Noble the Duke of Newcastle, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, is to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.
