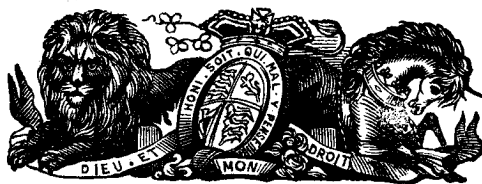

## PROCLAMATION.

*Increasing the Number of Wards in the Incorporated Town of West Hawksbury.*

By His Honor JAMES MACANDREW, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Otago.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* of the Province of Otago bearing date the twenty-third day of April, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, Thomas Dick, Esquire, then Superintendent of the Province of Otago, did, with the advice of his Executive Council, and in exercise and pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in him in that behalf amongst other things proclaim and declare, that from and after the day of the date of the said proclamation certain provisions of the "Otago Municipal Corporations Ordinance, 1865" specified in the first schedule to the now reciting proclamation, should extend to the said Township of West Hawksbury by and under the name of the Corporation of the Town of West Hawksbury, and should be applicable to and within the Municipality thereby created, and the said Superintendent with the advice aforesaid did by the said proclamation further declare that the said municipality thereby created should be divided into two Wards to be known respectively as East Ward and West Ward, and the boundaries of the said Wards should be those respectively defined in the fourth schedule to the said proclamation:—

And whereas, by the "Otago Municipal Corporations Ordinance Amendment Ordinance, 1866," it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Superintendent of the Province of Otago, with the advice and consent of his Executive Council, by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* of the said Province, from time to time to alter in any way he may think fit, the boundaries of any Municipality at any time proclaimed under the said therein recited Ordinances, and also to increase or diminish the number of Wards, and to name or alter the name and boundaries of any or every Ward of any such Municipality:—

And whereas it is expedient to increase the number of Wards in the said municipality, and to alter the boundaries of the said Wards, as defined in the said Proclamation, in manner hereinafter provided: Now, therefore, I, James Macandrew, Superintendent of the said Province of Otago, with the advice and consent of my Executive Council, and in exercise and pursuance of the powers and authorities vested in me in this behalf, do hereby Proclaim and Declare, that from and after the first day of August next, the number of Wards into which the said Municipality is divided, shall be increased, and that from and after the said first day of August next, the said Municipality of West Hawksbury shall be divided into Four Wards, to be known respectively, as East Ward, West Ward, Manse Ward, and Beach Ward, and that the boundaries of the said Wards shall be those respectively defined in the Schedule hereto.

## SCHEDULE.

*Ward Boundaries of the Incorporated Town of West Hawksbury.*

East Ward comprises all that area situate in the Township of West Hawksbury, bounded towards the north by the town boundary, towards the east by the town boundary, towards the south by a line along the centre of Bourke-street, and towards the west by a line along the centre of Beach-street.

West Ward comprises all that area situate as aforesaid, bounded towards the north by the town boundary, towards the east by East Ward, towards the south by a line along the centre of Bourke-street, and towards the west by the town boundary.

Manse Ward comprises all that area situate as aforesaid, bounded towards the north by East Ward, towards the east by the town boundary, towards the south by the town boundary, and towards the west by a line along the centre of Beach-street.

Beach Ward comprises all that area situate as aforesaid, bounded towards the north by West Ward, towards the east by Manse Ward, towards the south by the

town boundary, and towards the west by the town boundary.

A PROCLAMATION.

**W**HEREAS by "the Registration Act, 1853," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor at any time by proclamation in the *New Zealand*

*Gazette*, to divide the Colony of New Zealand for the purposes of the said Act, into such and so many districts as he may think fit, and that every such district shall be called by a distinct name, and shall be a Registrar's district; and it is provided that the Governor may at any time revoke the whole or any part of such proclamation and issue a new proclamation dividing the Colony or any part of it anew into districts, or increasing the number or altering the boundaries of districts as from time to time he may think requisite.

And whereas by a proclamation duly made and issued bearing date the twenty-ninth day of August, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, the Governor, in pursuance of the said recited power and authority, did amongst others constitute a district for the purposes of the said Act called the Clutha District, the boundaries whereof were therein set forth, which said proclamation came into operation and took effect on the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

And whereas it is expedient to revoke so much of the said proclamation as relates to the said district and to divide anew the territory formerly comprised within such district:

Now therefore, I, Sir George Grey, the Governor of the said Colony, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in me by the said recited Act, do hereby revoke the said proclamation so far as relates to the Clutha District, and do proclaim and declare that the territory formerly comprised within such district shall be and is hereby divided for the purposes of the said Act into two districts, the names and boundaries whereof shall be as follows:—

#### KAIHIKU DISTRICT

comprises the whole of the area contained within the West Clutha Hundred, bounded towards the north-west by the Popotunoa Registration District, towards the north-east by the Clutha River, towards the south-east by the East Clutha Hundred, and towards the south-west by the Popotunoa Registration District.

#### CLUTHA DISTRICT

comprises all that area bounded towards the north-west by the West Clutha Hundred, towards the east by the Clutha and its Kaou branch, towards the south by the ocean, and towards the west by the Popotunoa Registration District.

And I hereby declare that this proclamation shall come into operation and take effect on the tenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

**T**HE following instructions are republished for the guidance of Customs Officers, Magistrates, and others, in conducting investigations under "The Inquiry into Wrecks Act, 1863."

JOHN HALL.

Postmaster-General.

#### 1. Duties of Customs Officers, &c.

1. Any Customs Officer, or other person authorised by the Act, who shall apply (§ 7) to a Resident Magis-

trate, or two Justices to hear any case in reference to the wreck of any vessel, shall make such application in writing, stating therein the particulars of the case in respect of which such investigation is required.

2. The Customs Officer, or other person authorised, shall, before the commencement of the investigation, furnish a copy of such application to each of the master, mate, and engineer of the wrecked vessel.

3. The Customs Officer, or other authorised person, shall superintend the management of the case at the investigation (§ 9).

4. Should the Court be of opinion that any person connected with the wreck should be prosecuted criminally, the Customs Officer, or other authorised person, shall lay an information and prosecute in the usual way.

#### *Duties of Magistrates.*

1. Having taken evidence, the Magistrate or Justices shall in all cases prepare a report to the Governor, containing a full statement (1) of the case, and (2) of their opinion thereon, such report (3) to be signed by the Magistrate or Justices, and (4) by the Nautical Assessor, if there be one, and he concurs (5), and to be forwarded to the Governor through the Postmaster-General (6), together with the whole of or such extracts from the evidence as the Court shall think necessary (§ 9 and 10). Should the Nautical Assessor not concur in the report, he should forward his dissent and reasons therefor to the Governor (§ 10).

2. The Court has power, provisional on the Governor's confirmation, to cancel or suspend the certificate of any master, mate, or engineer, and in any case in which it may be considered proper so to cancel or suspend a certificate the Court should—

1. Take care that a Nautical Assessor sits with the Court.

2. Call on such master, mate, or engineer, to deliver up his certificate which under § 24 of "The Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," he is bound to do.
3. State in open Court their decision, provisional on Governor's confirmation, in respect to cancelling or suspending the certificate. ("Merchant Shipping Act, 1862," § 23, par. 3).
4. State, in their report to the Governor, the fact of a copy of the statement of the case upon which the investigation was ordered having been furnished to the owner of the certificate before the commencement of the investigation. ("Merchant Shipping Act, 1862," § 23, par. 6).
5. See that the Assessor concurs in the report, and signs it as so concurring. (Ibid).
6. Transmit the report with the whole evidence taken, and the cancelled or suspended certificate to the Governor through the Postmaster-General, for confirmation and transmission to the Board of Trade. (Ibid, par. 3).
