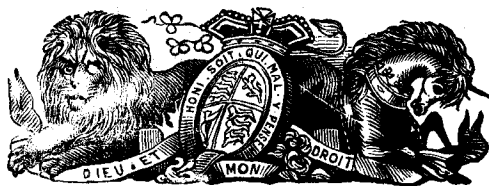

PROCLAMATION.

*Road District of Goodwood altered.*

By His Honor JAMES MACANDREW, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Otago.

**W**HEREAS by an Ordinance passed by the Superintendent and Provincial Council of the Province of Otago, intituled the "Otago Roads Ordinance, 1865," it is amongst other things enacted that, until otherwise provided, pursuant to the provisions of the said Ordinance, there should be sixty-one Districts, which should be named as specified in the Schedule to the said Ordinance annexed marked B: And it is also by the said Ordinance provided that it should be lawful for the Superintendent, with the advice and consent of the Otago General Road Board, from time to time, by proclamation in the *Gazette*, to alter, vary, diminish, or enlarge the boundaries of any or all of such districts, and to increase the number of such districts by forming and naming new districts:

And whereas it is expedient to alter the boundaries of the Road District of Goodwood as proclaimed in the *Provincial Government Gazette*, No. 446, on the twenty-fourth day of October, 1866:

Now therefore I, James Macandrew, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Otago, with the advice and consent of the Otago General Road Board, do hereby proclaim and declare that the boundaries of the Road District of Goodwood, as proclaimed in the said *Gazette*, No. 446, on the said twenty-fourth day of October, 1866, shall be altered, and that the area bounded as hereinafter described shall, from the day of the date hereof, be the Goodwood District (that is to say):—

All that area bounded on the north by Sections 47, 46, 45, 56, and 35, Block III, Moeraki Survey District, by Sections 67, 66, 65, Block IV, said Moeraki Survey District, and by portion of Block X, said Moeraki Sur-

vey District; on the west by Sections 12 and 16, Block II, Hawksbury Survey District; and on the south by Sections 1, 2, and 3, Block I, said Hawksbury Survey District. Again on the west by Section 5, said Block I, Hawksbury Survey District, and by a direct line from southern angle of Section 5 to north-east angle of Section 38, said Block I, Hawksbury Survey District; thence by Bush Reserve and Section 33, Block II, said Hawksbury Survey District, by Main North Road to northern boundary of Block IV, said Hawksbury Survey District; thence on the South by said northern boundary to Pleasant River; thence by said Pleasant River to the Ocean; thence on the east by the Ocean to the north-east angle of Section 50, Block III, said Moeraki Survey District.

the said Ordinance annexed marked B: And it is also by the said Ordinance provided that it should be lawful for the Superintendent, with the advice and consent of the Otago General Road Board, from time to time, by proclamation in the *Gazette*, to alter, vary, diminish, or enlarge the boundaries of any or all of such districts, and to increase the number of such districts by forming and naming new districts:

And whereas it is expedient to alter the boundaries of the Road District of Cranbourne as proclaimed in the *Provincial Government Gazette*, No. 492, on the twenty-fourth day of July, 1867:

Now therefore I, James Macandrew, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Otago, with the advice and consent of the Otago General Road Board, do hereby proclaim and declare that the boundaries of the Road District of Cranbourne, as proclaimed in the said *Gazette*, No. 492, on the said twenty-fourth day of July, 1867, shall be altered, and that the area bounded as hereinafter described shall, from the day of the date hereof, be the Cranbourne Road District (that is to say):—

All that area commencing at the north-east angle of Section 43, Block II, Hawksbury Survey District, and bounded on the north by Sections 37, 38, and 39, Block II, and Sections 45, 44, 43, 42, 41, 40, 39, 38, 37, 36, and portion of 35, Block III; on the west by Section 25, said Block III; thence on the south by Sections 43 and 44, Block V, and by bush reserve to township of Hawksbury; on the south-east by part of Township of Hawksbury, by part of Section 1, Block VI, Hawksbury Survey District, by an old road line to Section 49, Block IV, Sections 49, 48, 47, 46, and 45, said Block IV; by Pleasant River to the northern boundary of said Block IV; thence by said northern boundary to Main North Road; thence on the east by the Main North Road to north-east angle of Section 43, Block II, said Hawksbury Survey District, the point of commencement.

And whereas it is expedient to alter the boundaries of the Enfield Road District, as proclaimed in the *Provincial Government Gazette*, No. 499, on the eleventh day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven: Now therefore I, James Macandrew, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Otago, with the advice and consent of the Otago General Road Board, do hereby proclaim and declare that the bound-

aries of the Enfield Road District, as proclaimed in the said *Gazette*, No. 429, on the eleventh day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, shall be altered, and that the area bounded as hereinafter described shall, from the day of the date hereof, be the Road District of Enfield, (that is to say):—

All that area bounded on the north by the northern boundary of Block XVI and XV, Oamaru Survey District, and Block III, Kauroo Survey District; thence on the west by western boundary of said Block III; thence on the south by the northern boundary of Block II, Kauroo Survey District to the Kakanui River; thence by the said Kakanui River to the western boundary of Block XIV, said Oamaru Survey District; thence on the west, following said boundary line to the Kauroo River; thence following said Kauroo River to the southern boundary of Block XI, Oamaru Survey District; thence on the south by said southern boundary to the Waireka Creek, to the eastern boundary of said Block XVI, Oamaru Survey District; thence by the said eastern boundary to northern boundary of said Block XVI.

#### A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by "The Resident Magistrates Act 1867," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor from time to time, by Proclamation in the *New Zealand Gazette*, to constitute throughout the Colony, or in any part thereof, districts to be called Resident Magistrates' Districts, and such districts from time to time to abolish and the boundaries to define and alter, and in any such Proclamation to fix a time on and from which any such district shall be constituted or abolished as the case may be: And whereas by a Proclamation bearing date the twenty-ninth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, published in the *New Zealand Gazette* on the twenty-first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, His Excellency the Governor, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities for that purpose vested in him, did proclaim and declare the districts described in the Schedule to the said Proclamation, including amongst other districts the district of Clutha and the district of Southland, to be, on and from the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, Resident Magistrates' Districts within the meaning of the said Act:

And whereas it is expedient to define and alter the boundaries of the respective Districts of Clutha and of Southland in manner hereinafter appearing:

Now therefore I, Sir George Ferguson Bowen, the Governor of New Zealand, in pursuance of the powers and authorities for that purpose vested in me, do hereby proclaim and declare that the boundaries of the said Districts of Clutha and of Southland, as the same are defined and described in the Schedule hereto, shall, from and after the first day of November, be the boundaries of the Districts of Clutha and of Southland, within the meaning and for the purposes of "The Resident Magistrates' Act 1867," and I do hereby, from the date aforesaid, define and alter the boundaries of the said districts accordingly.

#### SCHEDULE.

##### *Clutha District.*

This district is bounded towards the North-east by the South-western boundary of the Dunedin District; towards the South-east and South by the sea from the mouth of the Taieri River to Chasland's Mistake; thence towards the West by a straight line to the summit of Black Horn Hill, thence by the summit of the range leading to Bleak Hill, thence by a straight line to the summit of the Cairn Hill, thence by a straight line to the source of the Kaiwera Creek, and by that creek to the Main South Road, thence by the eastern watershed of the Waikaka River to the summit of the Black Umbrella Mount; and towards the North by the Southern boundary of the Otago Gold Fields District, as the said districts are defined in Proclamation dated the twenty-ninth day of November, one thousand eight

hundred and sixty-seven, and published in the *New Zealand Gazette* of the twenty-first December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

*Southland District.*

This district comprises all that area included within the boundaries of the Province of Southland, including Stewart Island and the adjacent islands, and that portion of the Province of Otago lying to the westward of the Clutha District, hereinbefore defined.
