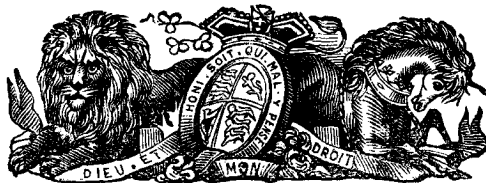

## ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Provincial Government Buildings, Dunedin, the  
21st day of September, one thousand eight hundred  
and sixty-nine.

Present :

HIS HONOR THE SUPERINTENDENT,  
DONALD REID,  
GEORGE M'LEAN, and  
GEORGE DUNCAN, Esquires,

Members of the Executive Council of the Province of  
Otago, being also Members of the Provincial  
Council thereof.

**W**HEREAS by the third section of the "Gold  
Fields Act 1866," it is enacted that it should be  
lawful for the Governor from time to time, by Procla-  
mation, to constitute and appoint any portion of the  
Colony to be a Gold Field under the provisions of the  
said Act, and the limits of such Gold Field from time  
to time to alter, as occasion might require : And whereas  
Thomas Dick, Esquire, then Superintendent of the  
Province of Otago, by virtue and in exercise of the  
powers delegated to and vested in him in that behalf,  
did, by Proclamation in the Government *Gazette*, of the  
said Province, bearing date the 29th day of January,  
one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, constitute  
and appoint all the territory therein described to be a  
Gold Field, under the provisions of the "Gold Fields  
Act 1866," to be called the Otago Gold Field : And  
whereas the limits of the said "Otago Gold Field," as  
described in the said Proclamation, has been from time  
to time altered and extended : And whereas by  
"The Gold Fields Act Amendment Act 1867," it

is enacted that within any Province in which by  
any Act or Ordinance it is provided that the Super-  
intendent shall, in the administration of the Govern-  
ment thereof, act by and with the advice and consent  
of an Executive Council, it shall be lawful for the  
Governor in Council, under his hand and under the  
Public Seal of the Colony, from time to time as occasion  
may require, to delegate to the Executive Government  
for the time being of such Province, subject or not to  
any restrictions or limitations as he shall think fit, all  
or any of such powers vested in the Governor or the  
Governor in Council by the "Gold Fields Act 1866,"  
as under or by virtue of the one hundred and ninth  
section of the said Act may be delegated by the  
Governor in Council, and in like manner to revoke any  
such delegation : And whereas by an Ordinance of the  
Superintendent and Provincial Council of the Pro-  
vince of Otago, intituled the "Executive Council Ordi-  
nance 1861," it is provided that the Superintendent of  
the said Province shall, in the administration of the  
Government thereof, act by and with the advice and  
consent of an Executive Council : And whereas the  
Governor hath, with the advice and consent of the  
Executive Council of New Zealand, and in pursuance  
of the power and authority for that purpose vested in  
him by the "Gold Fields Act 1866," and subject to the  
provisions, delegated unto the Executive Government  
for the time being of the Province of Otago all such  
powers vested in the Governor or the Governor in  
Council by the said last-mentioned Act, as under or by  
virtue of the one hundred and ninth section of the  
said last-mentioned Act, may be delegated by the  
Governor in Council, to have, hold, and exercise the  
said powers within the said Province of Otago : And  
whereas the Executive Government of the Province of  
Otago have determined further to alter and extend its

limits of the said Otago Gold Field, so as to include therein the area of land hereinafter described:

Now, therefore, His Honor James Macandrew, Superintendent of the Province of Otago, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Province, and by virtue and in exercise of the powers delegated to the Executive Government of the said Province of Otago in this behalf, and of the "Gold Fields Act 1866," doth hereby proclaim and declare that all that area of land hereinafter described shall henceforth be included in, and form part of, the Otago Gold Field (that is to say)—

All that area situate in the Province of Otago, containing by estimation seventy thousand acres, more or less; bounded by a line proceeding from Kurow Mountain to and along the Little Awakino Stream to the Waitaki River; thence southerly to the confluence of the Otakaik Stream; thence westerly along the said Otakaik Stream and the southern boundary of Run 28 to the boundary of the present Gold Field; thence northerly along the said boundary to Kurow Mountain, the starting point.

#### ORDER IN COUNCIL,

At the Provincial Government Buildings, Dunedin, the eleventh day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-nine.

WHEREAS by an Order in Council, made on the seventh day of November, 1868, and published in the Otago Provincial Government Gazette, No. 553, a Depasturing Regulation, Number 24, was made for the Otago Gold Field, providing that the Chairman of the Board of Wardens for the time being of the Tuapeka Depasturing District should receive applications for the depasturing of stock within that portion of the Tuapeka Depasturing District described in the Schedule to the said Order in Council of the seventh day of November, 1868: And whereas it is expedient to revoke the Regulation No. 24, so made by the said Order in Council of the seventh day of November, 1868, and to make another Regulation in lieu thereof.

Now, therefore, His Honor James Macandrew, Superintendent of the Province of Otago, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Province of Otago, doth, by virtue and in exercise of the powers delegated to the Executive Government of the Province of Otago in this behalf, hereby revoke the said Regulation No. 24, so made by the said Order in Council of the said seventh day of November, 1868, as aforesaid, and doth make the following Regulation in lieu thereof (that is to say)—

#### DEPASTURING REGULATIONS.

##### Otago Gold Field.

24. Mr. John Mackay, one of the Inspectors of the Gold Field Depasturing District, shall be and he is hereby authorised to receive applications for the depasturing of stock within that portion of the Tuapeka Depasturing District described in the Schedule to the said Order in Council of the seventh day of November, 1868.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House at Wellington, this first day of September, 1869.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

**WHEREAS** by an Order in Council dated the twenty-fifth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight, certain Harbor and Quarantine Regulations for the several ports and harbors of the Colony of New Zealand were made and promulgated: And whereas it is desirable that certain clauses of the same should be altered and amended:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the Colony, and in pursuance of the powers and authorities in him vested by "The Marine Act 1867," doth hereby order that from and after the date of publication hereof, clauses twenty-nine, thirty-three, fifty-three, and sixty-six of the said regulations shall respectively be amended as hereinafter appears:—

Clause 29. In lieu of clause twenty-nine it is provided that—

The master of every vessel shall anchor or moor where the Harbormaster or person deputed by him may direct; and he shall not unmoor or quit the anchorage, nor shall he haul his vessel alongside any public pier, wharf, or jetty, without having previously obtained permission from the Harbormaster or his deputy to do so; and any master offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.

Clause 33. In lieu of clause thirty-three it is provided that—

All masters or other persons in charge of vessels are immediately to strike yards and masts, to have their jib and spanker booms rigged close in, to moor and clear hawse, to lay out anchors or kedges, to slack down or heave in cables or warps, to heave ahead or astern, and to haul off from any pier, wharf, or jetty, when ordered by the Harbormaster or his deputy to do so; and whether they are lying at anchor or moored anywhere within the port, or are alongside of any pier, wharf, or jetty, are on all occasions when ordered by the Harbormaster or his deputy to do whatever the said Harbormaster or Deputy-Harbormaster may consider necessary or expedient with a view to the safety and interest of the whole shipping, and in consideration of the state of the weather, the crowded condition of the port or river, or any other circumstance; and any master offending against this regulation shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds.

Clause 53. In lieu of clause fifty-three it is provided that—

In the absence of any special regulations for any stated wharf, the time allowed to vessels to occupy berths at quays, jetties, or wharves, for the purpose of discharging cargo, shall be (exclusive of Sundays and holidays and the day of removal) as under:—

For ships under 100 tons ...	2 days
" from 100 to 150 tons ...	4 "
" " 150 to 200 tons ...	5 "
" " 200 to 250 tons ...	6 "
" " 250 to 300 tons ...	7 "

and so on, at the rate of one day additional for every additional fifty tons of the registered burthen of the vessel. But it is provided that the Superintendent may alter the time table given herein to suit the special requirements of any particulars port or wharf by supplementary regulations which shall be binding when made, the time table herein being only applicable to any pier wharf or jetty for which no special time table has been fixed by supplementary regulations.

Clause 66. In lieu of clause sixty-six it is provided that—

All watermen, stevedores, carters, or others engaged on any wharf or jetty, or at any public landing-place, shall be under the control and obey the orders of the Harbor or Pier Master; and any person disobeying this regulation, or in any way obstructing the traffic on any wharf or jetty or public landing-place, or making use of abusive or improper language thereon, shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding five pounds.
