II. It shall be lawful for the ratepayers in any road district to petition the Otago General Road Board to refuse any such request of the local board to borrow any such sum as in the last clause is mentioned and on being satisfied that two-thirds of the ratepayers on the assessment roll of the district are unfavorable to a loan being contracted the General Road Board shall refuse to comply with the request of the local board.

REGULATIONS of the Otago Education Board,
for the Examination and Classification of Dis-
trict School Teachers. February 29, 1872.

1. No election of a teacher shall be deemed valid until such teacher shall have produced to the Board a certificate of fitness or competency granted by the Board.

2. Certificates of competency will be divided into four classes, and will be granted upon examination by the Inspector of Schools, or other examiners appointed by the Board; but all teachers holding certificates of qualification from the Committee of Privy Council on Education in Great Britain, the Commissioners of National Education in Ireland, the Examiners under the Parochial Schools Act in Scotland, or an authorised Education Board of a British Colony, or of a Province in New Zealand, shall, without examination, be entitled to a certificate from the Board, corresponding as nearly as possible to the certificates so held by them respectively: provided that such teachers be of good character and sound health, as required under Regulation 4.

3. A certificate of the first class will be granted only to teachers of the second class in consideration of good service under the Board for not less than five years. A certificate of the second class will entitle a teacher to hold the office of head master or schoolmistress in a Main School, or of second master or schoolmistress in a Grammar School. A certificate of the third class will entitle a teacher to hold the office of master or mistress in a Side School, or of assistant in a Main School. Certificates of the fourth (or probationers') class will be granted to persons under thirty years of age who have not previously been trained or employed as School Teachers, but who may successfully pass the examination prescribed by the Board for certificates of the second or third class, and who may appear to possess qualifications likely to render them efficient school teachers. The holder of a probationer's certificate will be entitled to fill provisionally the office of a Side School teacher, or of assistant in a Main School. The holder of a first class certificate must be at least twenty-six years of age; of a second class certificate at least twenty-one years of age; and of a third or fourth class certificate, at least eighteen years of age.

4. Examinations will be held periodically at Dunedin, and such other central places as may from time to time be appointed by the Board (due notice of which will be given), when all candidates who present themselves for examination, and who are of good moral character and sound health, will be entitled to be examined in the literary subjects required under Regulation 15.

5. Every candidate for a certificate, after successfully passing the examination under Regulation 4, and producing satisfactory evidence of having been successfully engaged in the work of school teaching for a period of two years (at the least), will be entitled to a Provisional Certificate in the second or third class according to merit, but before receiving a permanent certificate of competency the candidate must as a teacher continuously engaged in a school or schools under the Board, obtain two favourable reports from the Inspector, with an interval of one year between them; and if the School Inspection to which the first of these reports relates be not preceded by service in the same school of three months (at the least), then a third report at an interval of one year after the second report shall be required. If the second (or third) report be favorable, a permanent certificate will be granted.

6. Every candidate for a certificate who successfully passes the examination under Regulation 4, but who is unable to produce satisfactory evidence of having been successfully engaged in the work of school teaching for a period of two years (at the least), will be entitled to a certificate of the fourth (or probationer's) class only, but every such candidate, who, as a teacher or assistant

teacher continuously engaged in a school or schools under the Board for a period of three years (at the least), shall obtain three favorable reports from the Inspector, with an interval of one year between any two of such reports, will be entitled to receive a permanent certificate of the second or third class, according to merit.

7. Holders of certificates of the third class will be raised to the second class only by re-examination, and the Inspector's favorable report as to fidelity and success in the work of teaching.

8. The examination for certificates will be open to uncertificated teachers at present employed in schools under the Board, as well as to persons not yet so employed; but until March 1st, 1874, certificates of the third class may be granted without examination in respect of scholarship, to uncertificated teachers at present in charge of schools under the Board who satisfy the following conditions:—

- (1.) They must at date of application
 - (a.) Be above 35 years of age,
 - (b.) Have been school teachers at least three years,
 - (c.) Present certificates of good character from their school committees.
- (2.) The Inspector must report
 - (a.) That they are efficient teachers;
 - (b.) That the children under instruction in their schools have passed at least three creditable examinations in reading, writing, and arithmetic.

9. After March 1st, 1874, no uncertificated teacher shall hold office under the Board.

10. Pupil teachers who have completed their engagements with credit may, upon special recommendation by the Inspector, and upon consideration of their last examination papers, receive a provisional certificate of the third class.

11. The Board may at any time recall, suspend, or reduce a certificate (whether provisional or permanent) held by any teacher, if convinced after full inquiry that such teacher's character, conduct, and attention to duty have been unsatisfactory.

12. The subjects in which candidates for certificates will be examined are divided into two classes—*essential* and *optional*. The former class embraces those more elementary branches with which it is necessary that every school teacher should be well acquainted. Reading, writing, English grammar and composition, arithmetic, geography, and British history are of this class, to which must be added as being equally requisite, acquaintance with the principles of school management, and if possible, military drill and the rudiments of vocal music and linear drawing. Schoolmistresses should be acquainted with needlework and the principles of household management.

13. The following is a list of the optional subjects in which candidates for certificates may be examined. The English language and literature, with composition; ancient and modern history; logic; mental science; political economy; physical geography and popular astronomy; chemistry; geology and mineralogy; botany; zoology and physiology; elementary mathematics (algebra, Euclid, and plain trigonometry); elementary natural philosophy; Latin, Greek, French, and other modern languages; music; drawing; stenography, and such other subjects as may from time to time be added by the Board.

14. Every candidate passing a satisfactory examination in the essential subjects prescribed for class two and in at least four of the optional subjects, whereof the English language and literature, Latin, or elementary mathematics must be one, will be entitled to receive a certificate of competency, with *first or second class honors*. An examination for honors will be held at Dunedin in the month of January in each year. Intending candidates must send their names to the

Secretary of the Board before the 1st day of November preceding the examination, with a list of the subjects in which they wish to be examined. No candidate will be entitled to a certificate with honors who has not also gained a second class certificate of competency by examination at the same time or on some previous occasion.

15. The following is the programme of examination for certificates of competency:—

(1.) FOR A CERTIFICATE OF THE THIRD OR FOURTH CLASS.

Reading and Repetition from Memory.—To read clearly and fluently and with proper expression both prose and verse, and to repeat from memory at least twenty lines of poetry.

Writing and Composition.—To write a specimen of the penmanship used in setting copies of text hand and small hand; to write from dictation neatly, and with correct spelling and punctuation, from an ordinary book or newspaper; and to write from memory neatly, grammatically, and with correct spelling and punctuation, the substance of a short narrative read aloud by the examiner.

Arithmetic.—The first four rules, practice, bills of parcels, simple and compound proportion, mental arithmetic, interest, vulgar and decimal fractions. *Female teachers*, to mental arithmetic only, inclusive.

Grammar.—To parse and analyse a sentence, and to have a fair knowledge of Douglas' Larger English Grammar, the Practical English Grammar of the S.S.B.A., or an equivalent text book.

Geography.—The elements of mathematical and physical geography, and the principal features shown on the maps of the World, Europe, Australasia, and New Zealand. Ability to draw maps from memory will tell very favourably.

British History.—Elementary facts and general outline to the accession of the Tudors; the reign of Queen Victoria.

Vocal Music—Linear Drawing.—Proficiency in either or both of these branches will tell very favourably; but failure in them will not necessarily prevent a teacher from gaining a certificate.

Female Teacher.—To be able to teach needlework, and to give object lessons to junior classes on such subjects as common domestic processes, common plants, animals and minerals—their appearances and uses.

Art of Teaching.—Before the permanent certificate is granted, the Inspector must have certified that the teacher is able to give a satisfactory lesson to a class in reading, writing, arithmetic, grammar and geography; and to keep a school in order, attention, and activity. (See Articles 5 and 6.)

(2.) FOR A CERTIFICATE OF THE SECOND CLASS.

Reading and repetition from memory.—To read clearly and fluently, and with correct expression and emphasis, both prose and verse; and to repeat from memory not fewer than twenty lines of poetry.

Writing and Composition.—To write a specimen of the penmanship used in setting copies of text hand and small hand; to write from memory neatly and grammatically, and with correct spelling and punctuation, the substance of a passage from an ordinary book or newspaper, read aloud by the examiner; and to compose a short essay on some given subject relating to school management.

Arithmetic.—Colenso's School Arithmetic, the

Practical Arithmetic (No. XIV) of the S.S.B.A., or an equivalent text book. *Female teachers*—the subjects required for the third and fourth class certificates.

Grammar.—Morell's Grammar and Analysis.

Geography.—Anderson's Geography, or equivalent text book; map drawing.

British History.—General outline from the accession of the Tudors to the present time.

* *Vocal Music.*

* *Linear Drawing.*

* *Algebra* as far as quadratic equations inclusive but omitting surds.

* *Geometry.*—The First Book of Euclid.

* *Latin.*—The Grammar, Cæsar (De Bello Gallico).

* *Military Drill.*

Female Teachers.—Needlework, Household Management, Notes of an object lesson.

School Management.—To compose the notes of a lesson, to draw up a time table, and to answer in writing questions on the different methods of organising an elementary school, and on the subject of moral discipline in school. Before the permanent certificate is granted the Inspector must have certified that the teacher is able to give satisfactory lessons to a class in reading, writing, composition, grammar, geography, and arithmetic, and to keep all the classes in the school employed and in proper discipline. (See Articles 5 and 6.)

* Candidates must pass in at least two of these subjects.

Richardson Scholarship.

THE Competition for the Richardson Scholarship will take place in the first week of May.

The subjects for examination, with the marks showing the relative value attached to each, are the following:—

English, 100; Arithmetic, 150; Geometry, Euclid, Books I and II, 100; Algebra, 100; Latin, 200; Greek, 100; Geography and History of England, from the Revolution to the Accession of Queen Victoria, 100; Natural Science, 100; French, 50.

Competitors must have attended for two years some Provincial School, and for one year the High School of Dunedin; and their age must not be over 18.

The Scholarship is tenable for three years, and the value is about £30 per annum.

The names of competitors must be sent in to the Secretary of University Council before 1st May.

1. *Classics*.—Separate Classes for Junior and Senior Latin and Greek. Professor: G. S. Sale, M.A.

3. *Mathematics*.—Separate Classes for Junior Mathematics, Mathematics and Natural Philosophy. Professor: John Shand, M.A.
4. *Mental and Moral Philosophy*.—Classes for Logic, Mental Science, Moral Philosophy, and Political Economy. Professor: D. Macgregor, M.A., M.B.

MATRICULATION.

The Matriculation Examinations for 1872 will be held at Dunedin on the 2nd and 3rd days of May.

The following are the subjects of examination:—

Latin:

Cicero—"De Amicitia."

Greek:

Xenophon's Anabasis, Book I.

English:

Writing from dictation:

French or German

Translation from French or German into English; translation from English into French or German.

Arithmetic:

The compound rules, especially square and cubic measures; vulgar and decimal fractions, proportion, extraction of the square root.

Algebra:

Meaning of the Algebraical signs, the four elementary rules, simple equations.

Geometry:

Euclid, Book I.

Geography:

The chief physical features and principal towns of Europe, Asia, Africa, North and South America; together with more minute details of the geography of Great Britain and Ireland, Australia and New Zealand.

Candidates will be entitled to matriculate who shall

have passed in Latin, English, and Arithmetic; and in any two at least of the other subjects of examination.

DEGREES.

The degree of B.A. will be attainable by (1) attendance upon the prescribed lectures during three sessions, and (2) passing an examination in certain subjects either at the end of the third or at the beginning of the fourth session after matriculation; or at the beginning or end of any subsequent session. There will be no honor examination in connection with the B.A. degree.

The degree of M.A. will be attainable only by those who have already taken the B.A. degree. The ordinary M.A. degree will be attainable by (1) attendance upon the prescribed lectures for at least one session after the taking of the B.A. degree, and (2) by passing a further examination similar in kind to that required of candidates for the degree of B.A., such examination to be held at the end of one year from the B.A. degree, or at the commencement or end of any subsequent session. There will also be an honor examination in connection with the M.A. degree. No one will be admitted to the degree of M.A. with honors, except such as have declared their intention of entering for honors at the time of taking the B.A. degree, or within six months afterwards. Candidates for the degree of M.A. with honors will be allowed to select one or more of the following subjects, and will be examined in such subject or subjects only:—

1. Classics and Philosophy.
2. Pure and applied Mathematics.
3. Natural Science (including Physics).

No candidate will be admitted to the degree of M.A. with honors after the expiration of three academical years from the date of his B.A. degree, nor after the expiration of six years from the date of his matriculation.

Attendance at Lectures.

All candidates for the B.A. and ordinary M.A. degrees will be required to furnish certificates of their attendance at the several courses of lectures prescribed for them. The courses of lectures will be somewhat as under:—

- (a.) For candidates in their B.A. degree in their 1st Year—Junior Latin, Junior Greek, Junior Mathematics, Natural Science.
- 2nd Year—Senior Latin, Greek and English, Senior Mathematics and Natural Philosophy, Natural Science, Psychology, and Logic.
- 3rd Year—Greek and English, Senior Mathematics and Natural Philosophy, Moral Philosophy, Natural Science and Political Economy.

- (b.) For candidates of the ordinary M.A. degree:—Natural Science, Senior Natural Philosophy, Moral Philosophy.

The greater part of the subjects of the lectures will be the same as the subjects of examination for the B.A. and ordinary M.A. degrees.

REGULATIONS for the Introduction of Immigrants into New Zealand on the nomination of persons resident in the Colony:—

1. Each applicant will be required to pay, at the time of making the application, the sum of £5 for each adult (except single women) and £2 10s. for each child between the ages of one and twelve years, whom it is desired to have introduced into the Colony. Infants in arms, under one year free. This rate being only for the ship passage from London (or such other port as the ship may sail from) to the Colony, the cost of reaching such port of sailing in Europe and proceeding up the country to their friends after arrival in the Colony, will have to be defrayed by the Emigrants themselves.

2. Free passages will be granted to single women between the ages of 12 and 35, provided they are able to produce proof of good character to the satisfaction of the Agent-General in London.

3. In the event of any emigrants applied for declining to emigrate, whatever money may have been deposited with the Government will be returned to the applicants so soon as the Agent-General in England shall have apprised the Government thereof; but in the event of any emigrants applied for accepting the offer of a passage in a particular ship, and so, by failing to present themselves for embarkation at the time and port appointed by the Agent-General in England for the sailing of such ship, be left behind, the passage money and passages will be forfeited.

4. Applicants in the Colony, when writing to the persons for whose passages they have applied, should distinctly inform them that no part of the passage money paid in the Colony will be returned, if they omit to write to the Agent-General in London, telling him that they decline the passages offered to them.
