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PROCLAMATION

Appointing certain Roads in the Invercargill Road District to be Main District Roads.

By His Honor James Macandrew, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Otago.

WHEREAS by the "Otago Roads Ordinance 1871," it is provided that upon the application of the Road Board of any road district the Superintendent may from time to time, if it shall seem fit so to do, by proclamation appoint that any roads or parts of roads, whether within or upon the boundary of such district, shall be main roads or main district roads: And whereas the Road Board for the Invercargill road district have applied to me, James Macandrew, Superintendent of the Province of Otago, to appoint the roads hereinafter described to be main district roads:

Now therefore I, James Macandrew, Superintendent of the Province of Otago, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in this behalf vested in me by the said "Otago Roads Ordinance 1871," do hereby appoint the following roads, situate within or upon the boundary of the Invercargill Road District aforesaid, to be main district roads, that is to say:—

1st. A road bearing due north through Block I, Invercargill Hundred, commencing at the south-east corner of section 9, block III, and extending along the eastern boundary of block III aforesaid; thence along the eastern boundary of the Invercargill town and Park reserves; and thence along the eastern boundary of section 26, block I, to the Waihopai river.

2nd. A road bearing north-north-west between blocks I and II, Invercargill Hundred, from the south-west angle of section 44, block II; thence along the south-west boundaries of the same section, of subsection 3 of 43, and of the cemetery reserve; across the main Dunedin road; and thence along the south-west boundaries of sections 8, 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2 and 1, block II, to the Waihopai river.

3rd. A road also bearing north-north-west through block II, Invercargill Hundred, from its junction with the main Dunedin road at the south-west angle of section 22, thence along the south-west boundary of that section, and along the like boundary of section 18 to the Waihopai river.

4th. A road bearing due east and north-east through blocks I and II, Invercargill Hundred, from the road on the eastern boundary of the Invercargill recreation reserve, at the south-east angle of section 8, block I, Invercargill Hundred; thence along the south boundaries of sections 8 to 13, block I, and along the south-east boundaries of sections 44 to 57, block II, to the eastern boundary of the Invercargill Road District.

5th. A road bearing south-eastwardly through blocks

II, III, and VI, Campbelltown Hundred, from the north-east angle of section 14, block VI; thence along the north-east boundary of that section, across the main road to Campbelltown; thence along the north-east boundaries of sections 4 and 9, block II; thence crossing section 1 and along the western boundaries of sections 2, 3, 4 and 5, block III, to the road forming the southern boundary of block III aforesaid.

6th. A road extending from the south-east boundary of Campbelltown, contiguous to Trig. Station W, along the high-watermark to the pilot station; the same forming the north-east boundaries of sections 7, 6, 5, 4, 3 and 1, and of the pilot station reserve, block I, Campbelltown Hundred.

PROVINCIAL COMPULSORY LAND TAKING ACT 1866.

of Otago; and also for the purpose of completing a road in the Caversham and Mornington Road Districts, parts of sections numbered respectively five (5) and six (6), and sixty-five (65) block six (6) Town District aforesaid; and also for the purpose of completing a road in the Mornington Road District, parts of sections numbered respectively six (6), block two (2), six (6) and eight (8), block three (3), sections seven (7) and eight (8), block four (4), Township of Mornington, being part of section ninety-two, block six, Town District aforesaid; and part of section eleven (11) township of Richmond Hill, being part of section ninety-one (91) block six (6), Town District aforesaid. BYE-LAWS passed by the Wardens of the Winton Hundreds :—

1. That no person be allowed to depasture more than fifteen head of cattle to every hundred acres occupied by him or her, and any person depasturing more than fifteen head of cattle shall forfeit and pay for every such offence any sum not exceeding five pounds.
2. That any person depasturing stock on the Hundreds who shall not have taken out a depasturing license, shall forfeit and pay for every such offence a sum not exceeding five pounds, and the cattle may be impounded.
3. All stock over the age of six months depastured on the Hundred, shall be branded with the registered brand of the owners thereof; and unbranded stock above the age of six months found on the Hundred, may be impounded to be dealt with according to law.
4. No bull over the age of nine months, or entire horse over the age of twelve months, shall be allowed to depasture on the Hundred, without the permission in writing of the Wardens or a majority of them, and any person turning out any bull or entire horse, without having such permission, shall forfeit and pay for every such offence any sum not exceeding five pounds.
5. All persons depasturing stock on the Hundred, shall furnish to the wardens, on or before a day to be fixed by them by advertisement in one of the local papers, a return showing the numbers, brands, and description of

all stock above the age of six months depastured on the Hundred by each of them; and in the event of any person bringing more stock on the Hundred, shall make a like return within fourteen days from the time of bringing said stock, and whosoever shall make a false return or shall fail to make such return, shall pay any sum not exceeding five pounds, and the cattle be liable to be impounded.

6. Any person disturbing or harassing stock depasturing on the Hundred, shall forfeit and pay for every such offence any sum not exceeding five pounds: provided always that a holder of a depasturing license within the Hundred, or any person duly authorised in his or her behalf, may drive such stock for the purpose of collecting such as belong to him or her, and for the free and legitimate use of his or her right of pasturage within the Hundred; but in the event of its being necessary for such purpose to drive any stock a greater distance than half a mile, the person so driving such stock must take them to the nearest available stockyard and there separate his own from those of other persons, and return the latter to the place from whence they were driven, and failing to do so, shall forfeit and pay for every such offence any sum not exceeding five pounds.

7. Any person removing stock beyond the boundary of the Hundred other than those belonging to him, or for the removal of which he shall not have an authority, shall forfeit and pay for every such offence any sum not exceeding five pounds.

8. That no sheep be allowed to be depastured on the Hundred; and any person depasturing sheep on the Hundred, shall forfeit and pay for every such offence any sum not exceeding five pounds.

9. Any stock not being the property of or which are not branded with the registered brand of the holder of the license under which they are depastured, or which are depastured on the Hundred, in contravention of any bye-law duly passed, may be impounded and the owner or custodian of such cattle may be proceeded against for trespass, and shall forfeit and pay for every such offence any sum not exceeding five pounds.

All or any of the acts authorised by these bye-laws, may be done by any of the wardens or other person duly appointed by them or authorised in their behalf.

The above bye-laws have been approved of and passed by us, this twenty-first day of February, 1873.

BYE-LAWS adopted by the Wardens of the New River Hundred, at their meeting on the 20th February, 1873.

1. That no cattle of any description be depastured on the New River Hundred without a license, provided always that cattle and horses of *bona fide* travellers on their journey, when turned out, be not considered trespassers if not longer than two nights in the same neighbourhood.
2. That no sheep or small cattle of any kind be depastured on the New River Hundred, and that sheep travelling through the district will be treated as trespassers if found without a shepherd, or if camped for the night within five miles of the previous day's camping ground.
3. That no entire horse over twelve months old be depastured on the New River Hundred; and that no bull or bull-stag shall be allowed to run thereon after fourteen days' notice to that effect has been given in writing to the owner thereof, by the Wardens.
4. That no person shall be allowed to depasture on the Hundred, more than one head of Cattle for every five acres of land in his occupation, and that all cattle so depastured must be branded with the registered brand of the runholder.
5. That all stray cattle, and cattle depastured in contravention of any of the foregoing bye-laws may be impounded, and that the Wardens will not be responsible for any

mistakes which may arise through cattle not bearing brands according to the "Cattle Branding Ordinance."

6. That every licenseholder shall, within fourteen days after these bye-laws are published in a local paper, make a return to the Warden living nearest to him, showing the numbers and brands of all stock depastured by him on the New River Hundred, and that the Wardens will not be responsible for any mistakes which may arise through non-compliance with this requirement.

7. That the penalty for any breach of the foregoing bye-laws be any sum not exceeding five pounds sterling, to be recovered in a summary way, according to the XLV clause of the "Land Regulations."

8. That nothing contained in the above bye-laws shall be held or construed to authorise the impounding of sheep or cattle, or the enforcing penalties from the owners of any sheep or cattle which are being depastured on any land, whether fenced or not, which is the property of, or is lawfully occupied by the owner of such sheep or cattle.

DEGREES.

The degree of B.A. will be attainable by attendance upon the prescribed lectures during three sessions, and passing an examination in certain subjects, either at the end of the third, or at the beginning of the fourth session after matriculation; or at the beginning or end of any subsequent session. There will be no honor examination in connection with the B.A. degree.

The degree of M.A. will be attainable only by those who have already taken the B.A. degree. The ordinary M.A. degree will be attainable by attendance on the prescribed lectures for at least one session after the taking of the B.A. degree, and by passing a further examination similar in kind to that required of candidates for the degree of B.A.; such examination to be held at the end of one year from the B.A. degree, or at the commencement or end of any subsequent session. There will be an honor examination in connection with the M.A. degree. No one will be admitted to the degree of M.A., with honors, except such as have declared their intention of entering for honors at the time of taking the B.A. degree, or within six months afterwards. Candidates for the degree of M.A. with honors will be allowed to select one or more of the following subjects, and will be examined in such subject or subjects only:—

SCIENTIFIC COURSE.

1st year.—Latin, Mathematics, Natural Science.

2nd year.—Latin, Mathematics, Natural Science, Mental Science.

3rd year.—Natural Philosophy, Natural Science.

Classes marked * are taught only three days a week.

In the Scientific Course students will not be required to attend both the English classes and the Moral Philosophy class, but must take one or the other.

Though students are recommended to adhere to one or other of the above courses, if they wish to graduate at the end of three years, the Council desires it to be understood that they are at liberty to take the prescribed classes in any order, and to spread them over a longer period.

SUBJECTS OF EXAMINATION FOR THE B.A. DEGREE.

Latin.—Portions from the works of two verse and two prose authors; selections to be made from year to year from the works of Lucretius, Virgil, Horace, Juvenal, Cicero, Livy and Tacitus. Questions on Grammar, History and Antiquities.

Greek.—Portions from the works of two verse and two prose authors; selections to be made from year to year from the works of Homer, Æschylus, Sophocles, Euripides, Herodotus, Thucydides, Plato, Xenophon. Questions on Grammar, History and Antiquities.

English.—A general knowledge of the structure and history of the English Language and of the principal periods of English Literature, with their representative authors.—Chaucer, Langland, Spenser, Shakespeare, Milton, and Dryden; selections to be made from year to year.

Mental and Moral Science.—1. Logic—deductive and inductive; books recommended—Bain's logic and Jevons' logic. 2. Psychology.—Lectures on nervous system; books recommended—Carpenter's physiology; lectures on the special senses and the intellect, including the historical evolution of modern doctrines. 3. Ethics—class lectures and the study of ancient and modern ethical theories; books recommended—Stewart's outlines and Bain's mental and moral science. 4. Political Economy; books recommended—Mill's political economy.

Mathematics.—1. Plane geometry; 2. Algebra; 3. Plane trigonometry; 4. Plane co-ordinate geometry and conic sections.

Natural Philosophy.—1. The elements of statics, dynamics, hydrostatics, and pneumatics, with the solution of problems not requiring the differential or integral calculus. 2. Heat and light as far as explained in the class.

Chemistry and Mineralogy.—1. Chemistry.—The principles of chemical combination and action; the chemistry of the non-metallic elements, of the metals, and of organic compounds; complex qualitative analysis: quantitative analysis of simple salts, and of limestones, silicates, soil, water, coal. 2. Geology and mineralogy: physical geography; dynamical geology: the nature and operations of geological agents; structural geology: rock-masses, their structure and relations, joints, cleavage, metamorphism, faults, unconformability; stratigraphical geology: structural characters of successive geological periods; Paleontological geology: characters and distribution of the more important organic remains. Mineralogy: physical and chemical characters and composition of minerals.
