PROCLAMATION.

Cancellation of Lease to Depasture Stock on certain Crown Lands in the Province of Otago.

By His Honor James Macandrew, Superintendent of the Province of Otago, in Council.

WHEREAS by the sixteenth section of the "Gold Fields Act 1866," it is enacted that when any Gold Mine or Gold Field shall be discovered and proclaimed upon any Crown Lands, which at the date of the passing of the said Act shall have been held under license or lease for depasturing purposes, it should be lawful for the Governor at his discretion to cancel the license or lease, under which such land shall have been held in occupation, as regards the whole or any part of the lands so held under such license or lease, or with the concurrence of the licensee, or lessee, to suspend such lease or license as regards the whole or any part of such lands: And whereas Thomas Dick, Esquire then the Superintendent of the Province of Otago, by virtue and in exercise of the powers delegated to and vested in him in that behalf, did, by Proclamation in the Government Gazette of the said Province, bearing date the twenty-ninth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven, constitute and appoint all the territory therein described, including amongst other lands, the lands hereinafter described, to be a Gold Field under the provisions of the "Gold Fields Act 1866," to be called "Otago Gold Field:" And whereas by the "Gold Fields Act Amendment Act 1867," it is enacted that within any Province in which by any Act or Ordinance, it is provided that the Superintendent shall, in the administration of the Government thereof, act by and with the advice and consent of an Executive Council, it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, under his hand, and under the public seal of the Colony, from time to time as occasion may require, to delegate to the Executive Government for the time being of such Province, subject or not to any restrictions or limitations as he may think fit, all or any of such powers vested in the Governor, or the Governor in Council, by the "Gold Fields Act 1866," as under or by virtue of the one hundred and ninth section of the said Act may be delegated by the Governor in Council, and in like manner to revoke any such delegation: And Whereas by an Ordinance of the Superintendent and Provincial Council of the Province of Otago, intituled the "Executive Council Ordinance 1861," it is provided that the Superintendent of the said Province shall, in the administration of the Government thereof, act by and with the advice and consent of an Executive Council: And whereas the Governor hath, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, and in pursuance of the power and authority for that purpose vested in him by the "Gold Fields Act 1866," and subject to its provisions delegated unto the Executive Government for the time being of the Province of Otago all such powers vested in the Governor, or the Governor in Council, by the said last-mentioned Act, as under or by virtue of the 109th section of the said last-mentioned Act may be delegated by the Governor in Council, to have, hold, and exercise the said powers within the said Province of Otago. And whereas the said lands hereinafter described are Crown Lands, subject to be dealt with under the provisions of the said 16th section of the "Gold Fields Act, 1866," and the said lands are now, or lately were, held under a lease for depasturing purposes, issued under the "Otago Waste Lands Act 1866:" And whereas the Executive Government of the Province of Otago have determined to cancel the said lease as to so much and such part of the lands held under the same as are comprised within the area hereinafter described:

Now, therefore, I, James Macandrew, Superintendent of the Province of Otago, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Province, and by virtue and in exercise of the powers delegated to the Executive Government of the said Province in this behalf by His Excellency the Governor of New Zealand in Council under the authority of the "Gold Fields Act Amendment Act 1867," and of any and every other power in any wise enabling me in this behalf, do hereby cancel the said lease, in so far as the lands comprised within the area hereinafter described are af-

fectured by the said lease, but no further or otherwise (that is to say)—

WHEREAS by section 11 of the "Protection of Animals' Act, 1873," it is enacted that no native game shall be hunted, shot, taken, or killed in any part of the Province, except during such months as may from time to time be proclaimed by the Superintendent: And whereas by section 3 of the said Act it is enacted that "native game" shall be deemed to include, *inter alia*, all native animals which shall from time to time be proclaimed to come within the provisions of this Act relating to game. Now, therefore, I, James Macandrew, Superintendent of the Province of Otago, do by virtue of the powers enabling me in this behalf hereby proclaim seals native game within the meaning of the hereinbefore recited Act: And I do further proclaim and declare that

no seals shall be taken, hunted, shot, or killed in any part of the Province of Otago, except during the months of June, July, August, and September.

BYE-LAWS AND REGULATIONS

OF THE DISTRICT BOARD AND RATEPAYERS OF THE DISTRICT OF THE PENINSULA.

Made under the authority of the "Highway Boards Empowering Act, 1871," and the "Otago Roads Ordinance, 1871, Amendment Ordinance, 1874."

Any person guilty of any of the following offences, omissions, or neglect within the said District, shall on being convicted of any such offence, omission, or neglect be liable to pay any penalty not exceeding five pounds, to be recovered in a summary way.

1. Removing any stone, timber, earth, or gravel from any road without permission from the Board.
2. Throwing or depositing any rubbish, dirt, stones, firewood, or any other matter upon any road calculated to injure the same.
3. Erecting without permission of the Board any fence, making any crossing, drawing any sledge, timber, or other material upon any road in such a way as to injure the same.
4. Filling up or damaging any water-table, culvert, bridge, bank, tree, or wall, or riding or driving upon any footpath.
5. Turning loose any horses or cattle upon any road, or allowing any animal to wander thereon.
6. Furiously riding or driving any cart, dray, waggon, or other carriage, or when meeting any vehicle refusing or neglecting to keep on the left hand side of road, or when passing any vehicle or animal going in the same direction not going or passing or not allowing any person desirous so to do to pass when practicable on the right or off side of such animal or vehicle.
7. The driver of any cart, dray, waggon, or other carriage, riding thereon without having and holding proper and sufficient reins, or the owner or hirer of

any such cart, dray, waggon, or other carriage allowing an incompetent person to have charge thereof, and of the animal or animals drawing the same.

8. Any person driving any cart, dray, waggon, or truck without the name and residence of the owner thereof being painted in a legible and permanent manner on the right or off side thereof in letters of at least one inch in length.
9. The driver of any vehicle injuring any person or any property whatever by negligence or by driving on the wrong side of the road, or by being away from the horse or cattle drawing such vehicle so as to be unable to have full control thereof.
10. Any person who shall act as driver or have the sole charge of more than one vehicle on any road.
11. Any person leaving upon any road any plough, harrow, cart, or other vehicle or implement without any horse or animal harnessed thereto unless in consequence of some accident having occurred.
12. Any person slaughtering or skinning any beast upon any road, or permitting any skin or carcase to remain there, or leaving any dead beast upon any road.
13. Any person leaving any iron, timber, or boards laid across any vehicle going along any road, so that either end shall project more than two feet beyond the wheels or sides of such vehicle.
14. Any person discharging any firearms or fireworks, or playing at any game upon any road.
15. Any person blasting any rock, stone, or timber upon or near any road without permission in writing from the Board.
16. Any person fishing from the North-east Harbor Beach Road or Bridge Crossing Anderson's Bay.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE ADMINISTRATOR OF THE GOVERNMENT IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by the 10th section of "The Inspection of Machinery Act, 1874," (hereinafter referred to as "the said Act,") it is, amongst other things, enacted that the Governor, by Order in Council published in the *New Zealand Gazette*, may from time to time declare that any other kinds of machinery than the kinds mentioned in the First Schedule to the said Act shall be machinery subject to the provisions of the said Act, and in any such case, and from and after a date to be fixed by such Order in

Council, the machinery therein mentioned shall be deemed to be machinery subject to the provisions of the said Act: And whereas it is expedient to declare that the machinery mentioned in the Schedule hereto shall be machinery subject to the provisions of the said Act: And whereas by Proclamation bearing date the twenty-sixth day of November, the said Act was brought into operation within the Provinces of Auckland, Taranaki, Wellington, Marlborough, Canterbury, Otago, and Westland:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Administrator of the Government of the Colony of New Zealand, in exercise and pursuance of the power and authority in this behalf enabling him, and by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Colony, doth hereby declare that from and after the first day of January next, the machinery mentioned in the Schedule hereto shall be, and the same is hereby declared to be, machinery subject to the provisions of the said Act.

Now, therefore, I, George Augustus Constantine, Marquis of Normanby, the Administrator of the Government of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the powers and authorities vested in me by the said Act, do hereby appoint the hulk called the "Sarah and Esther," now moored of Tahita Point, in the Otago Harbor, to be used as and to be a public prison within the meaning of the said Act; and do also hereby define the space of twelve yards around such hulk to be the limits and boundaries within which no person shall come; and do further hereby define Deborah Bay to be the place of embarking and landing prisoners to and from such hulk.
