A PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency Colonel THOMAS GORE BROWNE, Companion of the most honourable order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies and Vice-Admiral of the same &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand, intituled "The Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," it is enacted that the said Act shall come into operation on such day as shall be fixed by the Governor, whereof Proclamation shall be made and published in the Government Gazette;

Now, therefore, I, Thomas Gore Browne, do hereby proclaim and fix the day of the date hereof to be the day on which the said Act shall come into operation.

Given under my hand, at the Government House, at Auckland, and issued under the Seal of the Colony of New Zealand, this thirtieth day of September, in the year of Our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

Regulations respecting Delegation of Powers to Superintendents under "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861."

AT THE GOVERNMENT HOUSE, AT AUCKLAND,
THE FIRST DAY OF OCTOBER 1861.

Present:

His Excellency the Governor in Council

WHEREAS by Warrants under the hand of His Excellency the Governor, bearing date the first day of October One thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, the Governor has with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, delegated to the Superintendents respectively of the Provinces of Auckland, Taranaki, Wellington, Hawke's Bay, Nelson, Marlborough, Canterbury, Otago, and Southland, certain powers conferred on him by the "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," subject to certain Regulations to be made by the Governor in Council, under the recited Act; Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, of New Zealand, by virtue of the authority given to him by the 14th section of the above-recited Act, do hereby make and ordain the following Regulations:

1. The delegation of Powers under the said Act shall continue to be in force for the period of one year from this date, subject to be rescinded according to the provisions of the above-recited Act.

2. Each Superintendent shall, immediately after exercising any of the Delegated Powers notify the same to the Governor, and he shall transmit to the Governor particulars of all Appointments, and copies of all Regulations made by him.

3. He shall, so soon as conveniently can be, notify all Regulations made by him to the Colonial Secretary, or Chief Secretary of each of the Australian Colonies and cause the same to be published in England, in the *Times* newspaper.

4. In the exercise of powers delegated under the 9th Section of the said Act, the Superintendent of any Province may, either in the first instance, or afterwards from time to time by Proclamation in the *Government Gazette* of the Province, except out of any District, proclaimed as infected under the said Act any Port or Place within the limits of such District, and every such excepted Port and Place shall be deemed not to be within the proclaimed District and the Superintendent may also from time to time by Proclamation as aforesaid rescind any Proclamation of an infected District wholly or as to any part thereof, and also the Proclamation of any such exception as aforesaid.

5. In the exercise of powers delegated under the 10th Section of the Act, the Superintendent of any Province may prohibit the importation, either by land or by sea, of Cattle into such Province from any other Province, or any particular Port or Place in any other Province, or across the borders of a Province or any particular part thereof.

6. In all such last mentioned cases, such Superintendent shall cause notice as speedily as possible of such prohibition to be given to the Superintendent of the Province from which importation shall be prohibited, and also to the Governor.

7. The Superintendent of any Province may in his discretion, suspend or forbear to exercise all or any of the powers delegated to him under the said Act.

8. The Superintendent of each Province shall as soon as can be after the commencement of each sitting of the Provincial Council of such Province, lay before such Council copies and particulars of all appointments, regulations, acts, and proceedings, whatever issued, made or done by him under the delegated powers of the said Act.

9. If the Provincial Council of any Province shall by resolution declare that it dissent from all or any of such appointments, regulations, acts and proceedings, such resolution shall be forthwith transmitted by the Speaker to the Governor for his consideration.

PROCLAMATION

By JAMES A. R. MENZIES, Esquire,
Superintendent of the Province of Southland.

WHEREAS His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to delegate under the "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," to the Superintendent of the Province of Southland, the several powers vested in the Governor by the 2nd, 4th, 5th, 7th, 9th, and 10th, sections of the said Act, subject to the Regulations contained in the Order in Council of 6th September, 1861:

Now, therefore, I, the said Superintendent in virtue of the powers vested in me, do hereby proclaim that the Inspector of Diseased Cattle at the Harbours of the Bluff and New Rivers shall not be authorised, until further notice, to grant any certificate to land Cattle, as provided under the subsections (b and d) of section 4 of the said Act, to the owner of any Cattle imported from the Colony of Victoria: and I further appoint as Quarantine Ground for any Cattle landed under the provisions of subsection (d), section 4, the peninsula on the east side of the Bluff Harbour, known by the name of Tawai's Point; such Quarantine Ground being bounded on the west by the Bluff Harbour, on the north by the eastern arm of the Bluff Harbour, and by a right line extending due east from its eastern extremity, until it intersects the east boundary of the Campbelltown Hundred; on the east by the east boundary of the Campbelltown Hundred, from the said point of intersection to the sea coast, on the south by the ocean. And I further appoint that any Cattle which may be landed upon such Quarantine Ground shall not be removed from thence until the owner has obtained a certificate to that effect from the said Inspector.

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RULES AND REGULATIONS

*Made in pursuance of Section V. of the
"Cemeteries Ordinance, 1856," for
the management of the*

INVERCARGILL CEMETERY.

1. **T**HE Town Board of Invercargill shall have the entire control and management of the Cemetery.
 2. The said Board shall divide a portion of the Cemetery into three Classes, viz.—
 3. **CLASS I.** being ground of which the perpetual and exclusive right may be acquired, with the privilege of inclosing the ground, and of erecting headstones or other monuments thereon. A portion of ground of this class shall be staked off along the east side of the present fence, into lots of 8 feet by 10. These lots shall be sold for £3 each.
 4. **CLASS II.** being ground of which the perpetual and exclusive right may be acquired, but the purchaser shall not have right to inclose the same, or to erect a monument thereon, other than a flat stone laid horizontally, with inscription, or marked out by corner stones with initials or figures; provided that these horizontal or corner stones do not rise more than six inches above the surface of the adjoining ground. A portion of land of this class shall be staked off into lots for single graves, 8 feet by 4. The price of each lot shall be £1 5s.
 5. **CLASS III.** being a considerable portion of ground which has been set aside for the interment of such persons as are not purchasers of, and have not acquired a right to, private ground. On ground of this class no monuments or memorials whatever shall be allowed, and no grave shall, under any circumstances, be opened for any new interment sooner than after the expiry of five years from the time of the first or last interment, as the case may be.
- GENERAL REGULATIONS.**
6. All graves to be 6 feet deep, but in the event of the purchasers of private ground desiring a greater depth, an extra charge of 3s. 6d. shall be made for every foot more than 6 feet deep in 1st class graves, and 3s. per foot in 2nd class graves.
 7. The Town Board shall provide all necessary furniture and attendance for properly conducting interments.
 8. Any purchasers of private ground in which no interment shall have taken place, may transfer his or her interest in said ground to any other person, upon payment being made to the Clerk of the Town Board for the time being of a fee of 2s. for such transfer.
 9. A Plan of the Cemetery shall be prepared, showing particularly the lots so laid off together with the numbers thereof.
 10. The Clerk to the Town Board for the time being shall keep a book, in which he shall enter, from time to time, the number of

every lot sold, the name of the purchaser thereof, together with the date of the sale of the same, and shall keep a Record of the Burials in the Cemetery.

11. The Clerk to the Town Board for the time being shall receive the purchase-money for the sale of such lots, and shall give a receipt for the same, which receipt shall be held conclusive evidence of the purchase and selection of the lots mentioned therein.

12. In all cases of intended interment the person having the management or control of the same, shall apply to the Clerk of the Town Board for the time being for a warrant for such interment, which warrant the said Clerk is hereby authorised to grant upon payment to him of the following fees, viz.—

In the 3rd Class, or public Ground, the same Fees will be charged as in 2nd Class Purchased Ground.

For Paupers no charge shall be made for the Warrant or for Recording.

13. The said warrant, when received by the Gravedigger, shall be sufficient authority to him for such interment.

14. The monies arising from the sale of such lots, and the said fees, shall (after deducting thereout all necessary expenses incurred, and to be incurred) be expended in improving the Cemetery.

15. The Town Board shall publish a statement once a year, shewing the amounts received and paid by them on account of the Cemetery.

16. The said Record Book shall be open for the inspection of the public, on paying a fee of 2s 6d for each inspection.
