## CHARGES FOR FOOD:

For every calf, sheep, lamb, goat, boar, sow, or other pig ... ..	3	0

The above charges to be paid for each day, or part of a day, during which the animal is supplied with food and water by the Poundkeeper; but the owner may supply food and water, in which case these charges are not to be made.

## SOUTHLAND HOSPITAL.

*Rules for the Admission of Patients and the General Management of the Provincial Hospital.*

1. Applications for Admission must come through the Superintendent's Office, and the entertaining of such Applications will rest with the Medical Staff of the Hospital.

2. Persons receiving medical advice or treatment at the Hospital shall pay £1 10s. per week as in-door patients and 15s. per week as out-door patients.

3. None shall receive gratuitous medical aid at the Hospital, or admission therein, unless they can produce satisfactory evidence of their inability to pay for medical advice.

4. Seamen shall be admitted, provided masters of vessels and all others responsible for such payments shall enter into an agreement to pay charges for treatment for such person while in the hospital, or deposit such sum as the Surgeon may consider will cover the expense incurred, during the probable duration of the illness of such seaman; and such masters of vessels and others as above shall, in event of recovery being doubtful, deposit in the hands of the surgeon a sum of £4, to defray funeral expenses, in the event of death.

5. Patients for out-door or in-door treatment are to apply at the Hospital on Mondays and Thursdays, between the hours of 10 o'clock a.m., and 12 noon.

6. Cases of accident or emergency are admissible at all times.

7. Patients of all denominations can be visited by their respective clergy, daily, between the hours of 2 o'clock and 4 o'clock p.m. In cases of real emergency clergymen are admissible at all times.

8. Visitors are permitted to see their friends in Hospital on Mondays and Thursdays, between the hours of 2 o'clock and 4 o'clock p.m.

9. No articles of diet, intoxicating liquors, clothing, or the like, are to be introduced into the Hospital by the friends of patients or others, without the express sanction of the Medical Staff.

*Instructions as to conducting Investigations under "The Enquiry into Wrecks' Acts, 1863."*

**T**HE following instructions are published for the guidance of Customs' Officers, Magistrates, and others, in conducting investigations under "The Enquiry into Wrecks' Act, 1863."

1. *Duties of Customs' Officers, &c.*

1. Any Customs' Officer, or other person authorised by the Act, who shall

apply (§ 7) to a Resident Magistrate, or two Justices to hear any case in reference to the wreck of any vessel shall make such application in writing, stating therein the particulars of the case in respect of which such investigation is required.

2. The Customs' Officer or other person authorised shall before the commencement of the investigation furnish a copy of such application to each of the Master, Mate and Engineer of the wrecked vessel.

3. The Customs' Officer, or other authorised person shall superintend the management of the case at the investigation (§ 9).

4. Should the Court be of opinion that any person connected with the wreck should be prosecuted criminally, the Customs' Officer, or other authorised person should lay an information and prosecute in the usual way.

#### *Duties of Magistrates.*

1. Having taken evidence, the Magistrate or Justices, shall in all cases prepare a report to the Governor containing a full statement (1) of the case, and (2) of their opinion thereon such report, (3) to be signed by the Magistrate or Justices, and (4) by the Nautical Assessor if there be one and he concurs, (5) and to be forwarded to the Governor through the Postmaster-General, (6) together with the whole of or such extracts from the evidence as the Court shall think necessary (§ 9 and 10). Should the Nautical Assessor not concur in the report, he should forward his dissent and reasons therefore, to the Governor (§ 10).

2. The Court has power, provisional on the Governor's confirmation, to cancel or suspend the certificate of any Master, Mate or Engineer, and in any case in which it may be considered proper so to cancel or suspend a certificate the Court should,—

1. Take care that a Nautical Assessor, sits with the Court.
2. Call on such Master, Mate or Engineer, to deliver up his certificate which under § 24 of the "Merchant Shipping Act Amendment Act, 1862," he is bound to do.

3. State in open Court their decision, provisional on Governor's confirmation, in respect to cancelling or suspending the certificate. (Merchant Shipping Act, 1862, § 23 par 3.)
4. State, in their report to the Governor, the fact of a copy of the statement of the case upon which the investigation was ordered having been furnished to the owner of the certificate before the commencement of the investigation. (Merchant Shipping Act, 1862, § 23, par. 6.)
5. See that the Assessor concurs in the report and signs it as so concurring. (Ibid.)
6. Transmit the report with the whole evidence taken and the cancelled or suspended certificate to the Governor through the Postmaster-General for confirmation and transmission to the Board of Trade. (Ibid, par. 3.)
