BYE-LAWS PASSED BY THE WARDENS
OF THE FOREST HILL HUNDRED
AT A MEETING HELD ON 13TH MARCH,
1869.

I.—That any person depasturing stock
of any description on the said Hundred,
who shall not have taken out a depas-
turing license, shall forfeit and pay for
such offence a sum not exceeding five
pounds, and the cattle may be impounded
in any public pound.

II.—That no person shall be allowed
to depasture more than one head of cattle
over the age of six months for every
acre of land, which he or she occupies in
the Hundred; and any person depas-
turing more than specified, shall forfeit
and pay for any such offence a sum not
exceeding five pounds.

III.—All stock over the age of six
months depastured on the Hundred, shall
be branded with the registered brand of
the owners thereof, and any unbranded
stock found on the Hundred above the
age of six months may be impounded,
and dealt with according to law.

IV.—No diseased cattle shall be
depastured on the Hundred, and any one
who shall turn out or depasture any
diseased beast, shall forfeit and pay for
every such offence any sum not exceeding
five pounds.

V.—That no bull over the age of six
months or entire horse over the age of
twelve months shall be allowed to depas-
ture on the Hundred without a written
permission from the Wardens or a
majority of them, and any licenseholder
failing or neglecting to comply with the
same, shall forfeit and pay for every such
offence the sum of five pounds.

VI.—Any person wilfully disturbing
or harrassing stock depasturing on the
Hundred, shall forfeit and pay for every
such offence any sum not exceeding five
pounds, provided always that a holder
of a depasturing license within the Hun-
dred, or any person duly authorised in
his or her behalf, may drive such stock
for the purpose of collecting such as
belong to him or her, and for the free and
legitimate use of his or her right of
pasturage within the Hundred; but in
the event of it being necessary for such
purpose to drive any stock belonging to
any other person a greater distance than
half a mile, the person so driving such
stock must take them to the nearest
available stockyard, and there separate his
or her own from those of any other person,
and return the latter to the place from
which they were driven, failing to do so
shall forfeit and pay for every such
offence any sum not exceeding five
pounds.

VII.—Any person removing stock
beyond the Hundred, other than those
belonging to him or her, or for the
removal of which he or she shall not
have an authority, shall forfeit and pay
for every such offence any sum not ex-
ceeding five pounds.

VIII.—Any stock not being the pro-
perty of, or which are not branded with
the registered brand of the holder of
license under which they are depastured
or which are depastured on the Hundred
in contradiction of any bye-law duly
passed, may be impounded, and the owner
or custodian of such stock may be pro-
ceeded against for trespass, and shall
forfeit and pay any sum not exceeding
five pounds.

IX.—That any person intending to travel with or drive cattle through the said Hundred into any adjoining Hundred, freehold or leasehold, shall give not less than twenty-four hours notice in writing, stating the number, brands, and other particulars of such stock, to the nearest Warden, who, upon being satisfied that such stock are free from disease, shall give a written authority to the owner or party in charge of such stock for driving through the said Hundred; provided always that cattle of *bona fide* travellers on their journey when turned out, be not considered trespassers if not more than three nights in the same neighborhood, failing to do so, shall forfeit, and pay for every such offence, a sum not exceeding five pounds.

X.—That any sheep running upon unenclosed land in the said Hundred, shall be removed within twenty-eight days of publication of the said bye-laws, also, any cattle not being the property of freeholders, shall, if not removed within the same period, be impounded and dealt with according to law.

XI.—That sufficient power be left with the Chairman to appoint a Ranger, and the said Ranger to be paid at the rate of ten shillings per day, and two shillings and sixpence per head on all cattle over twelve months old that he finds depasturing on the said Hundred not according to these bye-laws.

XII.—That cattle shall be assessed at a fair and just rate to pay a Cattle Inspector, on condition that the electing of such Inspector be left with the public.

XIII.—All, or any of the acts authorised by these bye-laws, may be enforced by any of the Wardens, Rangers, or other person duly appointed or authorised in that behalf.

THE following bye-laws passed by the Wardens of the Oteramika Hundred have been assented to by the Waste Land Board:—

1.—No cattle of any description shall be depastured except by license holders.

2.—No sheep shall be depastured on the unenclosed lands.

3.—No entire horse over twelve months old shall be depastured without special permission of the Wardens.

4.—No bull over six months old shall be depastured without special permission of the Wardens, and no bull shall be kept at large for a longer period than three years.

5.—All license holders shall, on or before the 1st April, 1869, register with the nearest Warden a statement of the number of cattle and horses depastured by them, with their description, and the brands with which they are marked.

6.—Before removing cattle owners shall give notice, in writing, to the nearest Warden.

7.—Any person about to bring cattle on the run shall, one week before so doing, furnish to the nearest Warden notice in writing, with such information as shall give opportunity for inspection of the cattle.

8.—No person shall be allowed to depasture more than one head of cattle for every seven acres of land occupied by him on the Hundred.

9.—All stray cattle may be impounded.

10.—The penalty for any breach of the foregoing bye-laws shall be any sum not exceeding five pounds, to be recovered in a summary manner in accordance with the 45th clause of the "Southland Waste Lands Act, 1865."

11.—The foregoing bye-laws shall apply to the unenclosed lands of Blocks I., II., III., IV., only of the Hundred of Oteramika.
