IN exercise of the authority vested in me by the "Municipal Police Ordinance, 1862," I HENRY ROBERT RICHMOND, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Taranaki, do hereby give notice and declare that the undermentioned Footways in the Town of New Plymouth shall henceforth be deemed and taken to be Public Footpaths within the meaning of an Ordinance of the Lieutenant Governor of New Zealand, and of the Legislative Council thereof, intituled an "Ordinance to provide for the protection of Footpaths in the Colony of New Zealand," and shall be protected accordingly:—

DEVON-STREET—The footway of the width of fourteen feet six inches on each side of Devon-street, from Dawson-street to Gover-street.

COMMISSION.

International and Industrial Exhibitions to be held in Bombay, Paris, and Melbourne, respectively.

By His Excellency Sir GEORGE GREY, Knight Commander of the Most Honorable order of the Bath; Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, &c., &c., &c.

TO THEIR HONORS THE SUPERINTENDENTS FOR THE TIME BEING OF THE PROVINCES IN THE COLONY OF NEW ZEALAND, GREETING:

WHEREAS it has been proposed that an Inter-National Exhibition of Works of Industry and Art should be held in Bombay, which Exhibition it is proposed should be opened on the fourth day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

And whereas it has been proposed that a similar Exhibition should be held in Paris in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-seven.

And whereas it has been proposed that a similar Exhibition should be held in Melbourne in the early part of the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six.

And whereas it is expedient that a Commission should be appointed for the purpose of securing the proper representation, at such aforesaid Exhibitions respectively, of the produce, arts, and manufactures of the Colony of New Zealand.

Now know ye, that I, the Governor, reposing great trust and confidence in your knowledge and ability have authorized and appointed you, and do by these Presents authorize and appoint you the said Superintendents for the time being of the Provinces in the Colony of New Zealand, to be a Commission for the purpose of securing the proper representation at such aforesaid Exhibitions respectively, of the produce, arts, and manufactures of the said Colony.

And I do hereby further authorize you respectively to appoint in the several Provinces of which you are Superintendents, local Committees of such persons as each of you may consider it expedient to appoint for the purpose of encouraging the production of articles to be exhibited.

And I do hereby further authorize you respectively to conduct communication between the Exhibitors and the Commissioners of the several aforesaid proposed Exhibitions.

And I do hereby give and grant you the said Commission, and each of you, power and authority by all lawful means and ways whatsoever to carry out all matters and things tending to the completion of the object of this Commission.

Given under my hand, at the Government House, at Wellington, and issued under the Seal of the Colony of New Zealand, this thirteenth day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five.

DELEGATION

Of the Governor's powers under "The Gold Fields Acts Amendment Act, 1865," to the Superintendent of Taranaki.

Approved in Council November 18, 1865.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand, intituled "The Gold Fields Acts Amendment Act, 1865," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council under his hand and the public Seal of the Colony from time to time to delegate to the Superintendent of any Province, or such other person as the Governor may deem fit, all or any of the powers vested in the Governor or the Governor in Council by the Act now in recital, or by "The Gold Fields Act, 1862," or by "The Gold Fields Act Amendment Act, 1863," except the powers conferred by sections 19, 31, 33, and 61, of the said Gold Fields Act, 1862, and sections 19 and 29 of the Act now in recital, subject or not to any limitations or restrictions as he may think fit, and in like manner to alter or revoke any such powers: Provided always that it shall be lawful for the Governor, by proclamation in the *New Zealand Gazette*, to revoke and annul any proclamation or regulation made by the Superintendent of any Province in exercise of any power delegated to him by the Governor under the provisions of the Act now in recital, and from and after the publication of such proclamation by the Governor, any such proclamation or regulation made by such Superintendent shall become absolutely void and of no effect: Now therefore I, Sir George Grey, the Governor as aforesaid of the said Colony, with the advice and

consent of the Executive Council thereof, and in exercise of the power and authority for this purpose in me vested do hereby delegate unto

HENRY ROBERT RICHMOND, Esquire, as Superintendent of the Province of Taranaki, all the powers vested in me, under or by virtue of the said "Gold Fields Acts Amendment Act, 1865," the said "Gold Fields Act, 1862," and the said "Gold Fields Act Amendment Act, 1863," except the powers conferred by sections 19, 31, 33, and 61 of the said "Gold Fields Act, 1862," and sections 19 and 29 of the said "Gold Fields Acts Amendment Act, 1865," to have, hold and exercise, within the Province of Taranaki, the said powers hereby given to the said HENRY ROBERT RICHMOND, so long as he shall continue and remain Superintendent of the said Province and no longer. Provided always that copies of all rules and regulations made under the delegation aforesaid shall be forthwith transmitted to the Colonial Secretary, in order that the same may be laid before the General Assembly in accordance with the provisions of the sixty-third clause of "The Gold Fields Act, 1862."

Delegating Governor's powers under the "Diseased Cattle Act Amendment Act, 1865," to Henry Robert Richmond, Esquire.

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly of New Zealand intituled "The Diseased Cattle Act Amendment Act, 1865," section 4, the Governor may

by any Order in Council from time to time, annul make void or alter or vary and make anew any Orders in Council, regulations, appointments, or prohibitory or other declarations made and published by the Governor under the authority of "The Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," or of this Act, or by the Superintendent of any Province, under or in pursuance of any power delegated to him under any of the powers of delegation contained in the said Act; and whereas by section 4. of the said Amendment Act "as to regulations, appointments, and prohibitory and other declarations made by Superintendents of Provinces in pursuance of any powers delegated under the powers of delegation contained in the said Act or this Act, the power of annulling making void or allowing or varying and making anew any such regulations, appointments, or prohibitory or other declarations vested in the Governor by this Act, may from time to time be delegated by the Governor in Council by warrant under his hand to the Superintendent of any Province."

Now therefore, His Excellency Sir George Grey, K.C.B., in exercise of the power and authority so vested in him as Governor as aforesaid, doth by this Order in Council delegate to

HENRY ROBERT RICHMOND,

Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Taranaki, so long and so long only as he shall continue to be such Superintendent, all the powers which by the said fourth section of the said Amendment Act the Governor in Council is authorized so to delegate.
