ROADS AND BRIDGES.

Notice altering the Minimum Rates, and the month for General Meetings, and appointing General Meetings of the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th, 7th, 8th, 9th, and 10th Districts.

WHEREAS by the 49th clause of the "Roads and Bridges Ordinance, 1858," power is given to the Superintendent, with the approval of the Provincial Council, by notice to be published in the *Government Gazette*, to alter the minimum rate to be imposed in any District, and to alter the month in which General Meetings of the Electors for each District shall be held: Now, therefore, I, HENRY ROBERT RICHMOND, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Taranaki, do hereby, with the approval of the Provincial Council, appoint that the minimum rate to be imposed in the First, Second, Third, Fourth, Fifth, Seventh, and Ninth Districts shall be Four Pence per acre, and in the Eighth and Tenth Districts Two Pence per acre, and I hereby alter the month for the holding of General Meetings of the Electors for the under-mentioned Districts from the month of

November, 1866, to December, 1866; and I hereby appoint that such General Meetings shall be held as follows:—

SIGNALS AT MOUNT ELIOT AS TO
THE CLOSING OF MAILS.

IT is hereby notified for general information that henceforward a white flag will be hoisted at the flagstaff, Mount Eliot, on ordinary occasions, one hour before the closing of Mails to be despatched by steamers from this port.

When, from bad weather or other causes, it is necessary to close the Mail sooner than was anticipated, the same flag will be hoisted half-mast high, and will be kept there until the Mail is closed. The flag half-mast high will therefore mean that the Mail closes *almost immediately*.
