The River Patea is about thirty-five miles northwest of Whanganui. It is accessible to coasting craft and small steamers, and navigable for vessels drawing six feet, for fifteen or twenty miles. It is likely to become the place of trade of the Ngatiruanui Country, one of the finest agricultural districts in the Colony; and, although no land has yet been sold, the Township already contains a considerable population.

Plans may be inspected at the office of the Secretary for Crown Lands, Wellington; and the Offices of the Commissioners of Crown Lands, throughout the Colony; at the Resident Magistrates Court House, Carlyle, and at the Custom House, Whanganui.

WAITARA RIVER, PROVINCE OF TARANAKI.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.—The following remarks on and sailing directions for the Waitara River, in the Province of Taranaki, are published for general information.

REMARKS ON THE ENTRANCE TO THE WAITARA RIVER, PROVINCE OF TARANAKI, AND DIRECTIONS FOR VESSELS APPROACHING IT.

The mouth of the Waitara River is about ten miles to the N.E. from the Flagstaff at New Plymouth. There is a shifting bar at the entrance having sometimes one and sometimes two channels, the northern chan-

nel being principally used. It is high water on the bar at full and change at high 9.45. The depth in the main channel at low water spring tides is about two feet. Range of tides from seven to twelve feet.

The flood tide runs two to three knots; the ebb, three to four knots in the entrance of the river. Along shore, flood tide runs to the eastward and ebb tide to the westward from one to two knots.

The general soundings one mile off shore from New Plymouth to Waitara are from five to seven fathoms sand and rocks. A submerged reef, known as the Puketapu Reef, lies about three miles to the west of the entrance and extends to the distance of one mile from the shore. Shoal water extends with rocky bottom for half a mile off shore on each side of the Waitara bight.

A flagstaff with yard and semaphore arm has been erected on the south side of the river, and vessels will be guided in by the Signal Master. Masters of vessels are requested to pay particular attention to the signals from the flagstaff and alter the course of the vessel promptly in the direction towards which the semaphore arm is pointed. When the semaphore arm is dropped the vessel is to be kept steady as she goes. Marryat's code of signals, and the special signals given below, are in use at the Waitara signal station.

Wait for high water:

A ball at each yardarm, and one on mast half the length of the yard below it.

Stand on, take the bar:

Four balls horizontal on yard, two on each side of mast.

Bar dangerous, keep off:

Three balls horizontal on yard, two on any one side of mast and one on the other.

Put to sea:

Two balls horizontal on yard.

No vessel should approach the shore at night within ten fathoms soundings. This depth will carry a vessel outside the points of the reef. In heavy south-west gales no vessel should approach the Waitara River. In fine weather a vessel drawing nine feet six inches may enter the river at spring tides. Vessels drawing from seven to eight feet may trade there habitually without difficulty.

Sailing directions for vessels approaching.

From the North.—Bring the summit of Mount Egmont to bear $S \frac{1}{2} W$. and steer on that bearing until White Bluff (Parinihi) bears N. E. by E. The vessel will then be about two miles from the flagstaff at the entrance to the river which will bear S.E. by

S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. and by steering on that bearing (or direct for the flagstaff) she will be brought to the anchorage which is three quarters of a mile from the shore, and may anchor, unless otherwise directed by the Signal Master.

From the South.—When abreast of the 'Outer Sugar Loaf' Island (Motumahanga), distant quarter of a mile, steer N.E. until the flagstaff at the Waitara bears S. E. by S. $\frac{1}{2}$ S. and then steer for the flagstaff until the Outer Sugar Loaf Island is in line with Kate Point (the western point of the Waitara bight) bearing S.W. by W. (westerly.) A vessel will then be in six fathoms sandy bottom and may anchor with safety three quarters of a mile off shore. The Seal Rock (the westernmost of the Sugar Loaf group) should on no account be opened south of the Outer Sugar Loaf (Motumahanga) until the flagstaff at the Waitara bears S.E. A vessel will thus keep clear of the roll on Puketapu Reef.

ORDER IN COUNCIL

At the Government House, at Wellington, the twenty-seventh day of February, 1868.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN
COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by "The New Plymouth Exchanges Commission Act, 1865," it is amongst other things enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, at any time and from time to time, to issue for and within the Province of Taranaki one or more Commission or Commissions under the Public Seal of the Colony, appointing one or more fit person or persons to be a Commissioner or Commissioners for the purposes therein mentioned, and any and every such Commission at any time to revoke, and to issue a new commission instead thereof.

And whereas by the said Act it is further enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council, in and by any and every such Commission, to order and direct that the powers and duties of the Commissioner or Commissioners therein named, shall be exercised and performed and the business of the Commission conducted according to regulations to be at any time and from time to time made and prescribed by any Order or Orders in Council, and such regulations may be made and

prescribed by any Order or Orders in Council accordingly, and may be revoked or altered in whole or in part by any subsequent regulation or regulations to be at any time and from time to time made as aforesaid.

And whereas in pursuance and exercise of the said power and authority, His Excellency Sir George Grey, then being Governor of New Zealand, did by Commission bearing date the twenty-third day of February, 1866, appoint

JOSIAH FLIGHT, and

JOHN STEPHENSON SMITH,

both of New Plymouth, in the Province of Taranaki, in the Colony of New Zealand, Esquires, to be "New Plymouth Exchange Commissioners" under the said Act, and did in and by such Commission order and direct that the powers and duties of the said Commissioners thereby appointed and therein named should be exercised and performed, and the business of the said Commission conducted according to regulations made and prescribed by an Order in Council of even date with the said Commission: And whereas His Excellency Sir George Grey, then being Governor of New Zealand, in exercise and pursuance of the said recited power, and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, did by a certain Order in Council made the twenty-third day of February, 1866, order and direct that the powers and duties of the said Commissioners appointed by the said Commission should be exercised and performed, and the business of the said Commission conducted according to regulations set forth in the Schedule to the Order. And whereas His Excellency Sir George Ferguson Bowen, Governor of New Zealand, in exercise and pursuance of all powers and authorities enabling him in that behalf, and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Colony, hath issued a Commission of even date herewith revoking the said Commission dated the twenty-third day of February, 1866, and appointing the said Josiah Flight and John Stephenson Smith to be New Plymouth Exchange Commissioners under the said first recited Act, and did in and by such Commission define and declare the powers, duties, and authorities of such Commissioners. And whereas it is expedient to revoke the said regulations and to make new regulations:

Now, therefore, His Excellency the Governor, in pursuance and exercise of the said power and authority in him vested for this purpose, doth by this present Order, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Council, order and

direct that the said Order in Council, dated the twenty-third day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-six, and the regulations contained therein and prescribed thereby, shall be wholly revoked, and with the like advice and consent doth hereby order and direct that the powers and duties of the Commissioners named in the said Commission, of even date herewith, shall be exercised and performed, and the business of the said Commission conducted according to the regulations set forth in the Schedule hereto.

SCHEDULE.
Regulations.

1. Whenever any exchange of land has been authorized or effected without the consent of the original owner or owners of the land taken to be so given in exchange, the consent in writing of such owner or owners, or of their duly authorized agent, shall be obtained if possible.

2. When the original owner, whose land is proposed to be taken and granted in exchange without his consent, is an absentee from the Province of Taranaki, a notice specifying the name of such original owner, the number and acreage of the section to be taken and of that to be given in exchange for it, and calling upon such owner to appear by himself or agent before the Commissioners, shall be inserted in the New Zealand Government *Gazette*, and at least three times in the *Times* newspaper of London, unless the owner is known to be within the Colony.

3. The day fixed for the appearance of such absentee owner shall be at least four months after the date of the insertion of the last of such advertisements in the *Times*.

4. If the owner is known to be within the Colony of New Zealand, a notice to the above effect should be inserted in the New Zealand *Gazette*, and at least three times in some newspaper in circulation within the Province of Taranaki. The day for the appearance in such case shall be at the least two months after the insertion of the notice.

5. If on the day appointed the absentee owner does not appear in his own person or by agent, the Commissioners will proceed and investigate and decide the case in his absence.

6. Provided that before any land is authorized to be taken for exchange without the consent of the original owner, the Commissioner shall publish in the Government *Gazette* of New Zealand, and in some newspaper published in Taranaki, a statement specifying the section to be taken, and that to be given in exchange, with the name of the original owner and proposed grantee of each, and a certificate under the hands of the Commissioners of the actual value of each of the sections given and taken

in exchange respectively, as ascertained by them, and of their being satisfied that the exchange will be for the mutual benefit of the parties concerned.

7. Provided further that no such exchange shall be confirmed by the Commissioners until a week at least after the insertion of such certificate in the newspaper as aforesaid.

8. The Commissioners shall be at liberty to charge a fee of five shillings per section in respect of every certificate issued by them to any person or persons except the Superintendent of Taranaki.

A PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS by an Act made and enacted in the Imperial Parliament holden in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of the reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to grant a Representative Constitution to the Colony of New Zealand," it is amongst other things enacted, that whenever any Bill shall have been assented to by the Superintendent, as in the said Act, provided, the Superintendent shall forthwith transmit to the Governor an authentic copy thereof, and it shall be lawful for the Governor, at any time within three months after any such Bill shall have been received by him, to declare by proclamation his disallowance of such Bill; and that any such disallowance shall make void and annul the same from and after the day of the date of such proclamation, or any subsequent day to be named therein.

And whereas the Ordinance hereinafter specified has been enacted by the Superintendent of Taranaki with the advice and consent of the Provincial Council thereof and the said Ordinance was received by the Governor on the seventh day of February, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight.

And whereas it is expedient that the said Ordinance should be disallowed:

Now therefore, I, the Governor of New Zealand, in pursuance of the authority vested in me in that behalf by the said recited Act of Parliament, do hereby proclaim and declare my disallowance of the following Ordinance passed by the Superintendent and Provincial Council of the Province of Taranaki, namely:—

"Furze Ordinance, 1867."

chael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, and issued under the Seal of the said Colony of New Zealand, at the Government House, at Wellington, this twenty-eighth day of February, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight.

NOTICE to all persons having dealings with Natives in Native Land.—Purchasers, lessees, and others having dealings with aboriginal natives in respect of lands, the titles to which have passed through the Native Land Court, are hereby warned that all transfers of estates and interest so derived are invalid until the duty payable under the fifty-fifth section of "The Native Lands Act, 1865," has been paid, and the Colonial Treasurer's receipt endorsed upon the deed.

With as little delay as possible after execution of the deed of assurance, it should be presented for assessment at the Registry of Deeds for the Province in which the lands are situate accompanied by an affidavit of the transferee, his solicitor, or some other person competent to speak to the facts, stating that the full consideration money directly or indirectly paid on the transaction is expressed in the deed. Any deception or concealment in this respect will subject the parties to severe penalty.

On being satisfied that the true consideration is expressed, the Registrar will certify the amount of duty payable on the transaction. The deed together with the Registrar's certificate should then be presented at the Treasury, and the amount of the assessment paid. The Treasurer will endorse his receipt upon the deed after which it may be registered upon payment of the usual fees.

It should be particularly borne in mind that if the duty is not paid within six months from the date of the execution of the deed, the party liable to pay the same will be subject to a penalty of three times the amount of duty payable. And that the Treasury will not accept payment of duty, except on production of the Registrar's certificate.

It should also be particularly observed that under the provisions of "The Native Lands Act, 1867," in any case where a notification has been made by the Chief Judge of the Native Lands Court, to the Secretary of Crown Lands,

that any fees are due and unpaid for the survey of the land comprised in a certificate issued by that Court, the Crown Grant of the same land cannot be registered until the said Judge shall have notified that payment of such fees has been made.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington, the eighteenth day of March, 1868.

Present :

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by an Act of the General Assembly, intituled "The New Zealand Post Office Act, 1858," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time by proclamation in the *New Zealand Gazette*, to fix, alter, and abolish the rates of postage at any time payable within the Colony, for the transmission of letters by post either between places within New Zealand, or to or from places beyond seas, and at what time the same shall be paid, and the postage so made payable shall be charged and paid accordingly. And it is also by the said Act enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor in Council from time to time to make rules and regulations for the managing of the several post-offices, and for the conduct of post officers. And whereas by "The New Zealand Post Office Act Amendment Act, 1866," it is provided that certain postage shall be levied upon newspapers posted within the Colony, and by the said last-mentioned Act it is provided that every copy of a paper containing any public news or occurrences, or any remarks or observations thereon, or any political matter, or containing only or principally advertisements, and printed for sale or gratuitous distribution, may be sent by post as a newspaper if it shall be periodical published in parts or numbers at intervals not exceeding one month. And whereas by "The New Zealand

Post Office Act Amendment Act, 1866," (No. 2), it is provided that the power conferred by "The New Zealand Post Office Act, 1858," on the Governor in Council, to fix, alter, and abolish rates of postage, and to make rules for regulating post office services, shall and be deemed to be limited, altered, or affected by "The New Zealand Post Office Act Amendment Act, 1866," subject however to the proviso in "The Post Office Act Amendment Act, 1866" (No. 2), mentioned. And whereas it is expedient that the *New Zealand Gazette* printed and published under the authority of the New Zealand Government should not be treated as a newspaper, but should be exempt from postage. And whereas it is also expedient that the several *Gazettes* printed and published under the authority of Superintendents of Provinces, and the *Gazette* printed and published in and for the County of Westland under the authority of the Governor or his delegate, should respectively be exempt from postage :

Now therefore, His Excellency Sir George Ferguson Bowen, Governor of New Zealand, in exercise and pursuance of all powers and authorities enabling him in this behalf, and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the Colony, doth hereby order that the printed papers mentioned in the Schedule hereto shall be allowed to pass through all Post Offices in New Zealand free of postage, if enclosed in a paper wrapper open at each end, having written or printed on such wrapper in legible characters the words following, that is to say— "Exempt from postage, being a Government Gazette."

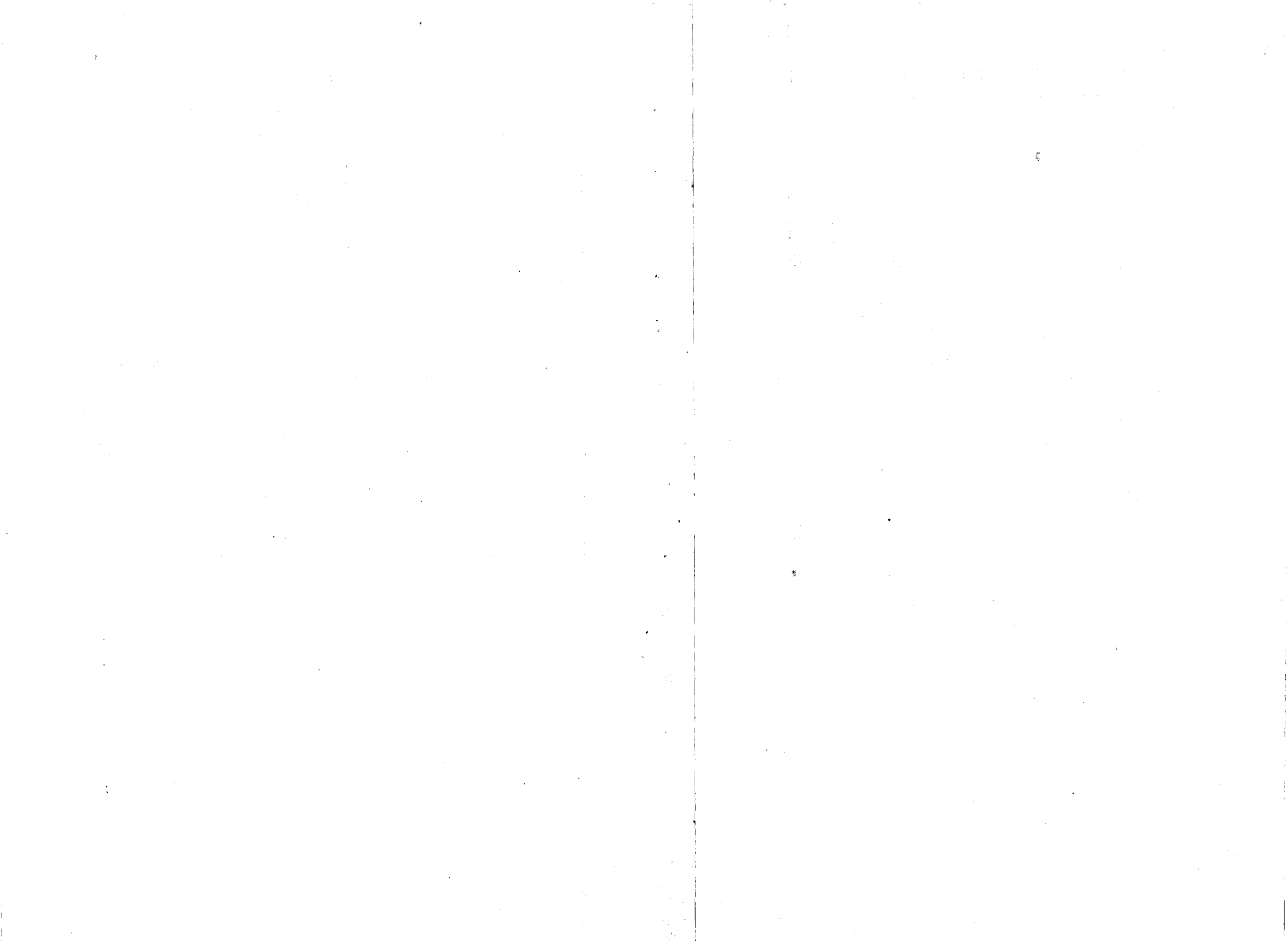
