THE following Provincial Hospital Regulations are published for general information:—

Regulations for the Provincial Hospital, New Plymouth.

1. Persons desiring to obtain admission into the Provincial Hospital must, if possible, apply personally to the Superintendent or Provincial Secretary, or in the case of persons of the native race and half-castes to the Civil Commissioner or his representative, for an order. If the person requiring treatment is too ill to apply personally, the order may be applied for by any other person on his behalf.

2. Persons who have obtained an order as above must present the same to the Colonial Surgeon at the Provincial Hospital at 10½ a.m., who, after having enquired into the case, shall countersign such order if he considers that Hospital treatment is required.

2. In cases of severe accident or sudden

illness the Hospital Steward may admit patients in the Hospital provisionally without an order, but in other cases no applicant shall be admitted except upon production of an order countersigned by the Provincial Surgeon.

4. The patients to be in future admitted free will be only such as are destitute, and cannot obtain relief from their friends. Those who can afford to pay will be charged at the rate of 2s. per diem, and on applying for an order of admission will be required to sign a memorandum that they are willing to pay at that rate.

5. Patients will not be permitted to remain in the Hospital after the Provincial Surgeon certifies that they are sufficiently recovered to attend to their usual trade or calling.

6. Patients in the hospital are to obey all directions given by the steward with a view to the preservation of order and quietness, and are to refrain altogether from talking or making any unnecessary noise when requested to do so.

7. Convalescent patients may be required to assist in the care of their fellow patients, or to do such light work in or about the

hospital as the Provincial Surgeon may sanction in each case.

8. The Provincial Surgeon will attend at the Provincial Hospital daily, at half-past ten o'clock in the morning, for the purpose of giving medical advice and supplying medicines gratuitously to the poor; but, if the circumstances of any applicant do not appear to be such as to justify him in applying for gratuitous medical aid, the Provincial Surgeon shall refuse to prescribe for such applicant, unless he shall produce a written order from the Superintendent or Provincial Secretary.

Wellington, 31st January, 1868.

NOTICE to all persons having dealings
with Natives in New Zealand.—Pur-
chasers, lessees, and others having dealings
with aboriginal natives in respect of lands,
the titles to which have passed through the
Native Land Court, are hereby warned that
all transfers of estates and interests so de-
rived are invalid until the duty payable
under the fifty-fifth section of "The Native
Lands Act, 1865," was been paid, and the
Colonial Treasurer's receipt endorsed upon
the deed.

With as little delay as possible after exe-
cution of the deed of assurance, it should be
presented for assessment at the Registry of
Deeds for the Province in which the lands
are situate accompanied by an affidavit of
the transferee, his solicitor, or some other
person competent to speak to the facts,
stating that the full consideration money
directly or indirectly paid on the transaction
is expressed in the deed. Any deception or
concealment in this respect will subject the
parties to severe penalties.

On being satisfied that the true considera-
tion is expressed, the Registrar will certify
the amount of duty payable on the transac-
tion. The deed together with the Regis-
trar's certificate should be then presented at
the Treasury, and the amount of the assess-
ment paid. The Treasurer will endorse his
receipt upon the deed after which it may be
registered upon payment of the usual fees.

It should be particularly borne in mind
that if the duty is not paid within six
months from the date of the execution of
the deed, the party liable to pay the same
will be subject to a penalty of three times
the amount of duty payable. And that the
Treasury will not accept payment of duty,
except on production of the Registrar's
certificate.

It should also be particularly observed
that under the provisions of "The Native
Lands Act, 1867," in any case where a noti-
fication has been made by the Chief Judge
of the Native Lands Court, to the Secretary
of Crown Lands, that any fees are due and
unpaid for the survey of the land comprised
in a certificate issued by that Court, the
Crown Grant of the same land cannot be
registered until the said Judge shall have
notified that payment of such fees has been
made.

HIS Excellency the Governor directs the publication, for general information, of the following reply from His Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburgh to the numerous Addresses of Sympathy from different parts of the Colony. It is hoped that the reply which His Royal Highness has been graciously pleased to make will be accepted in the case of each of those Addresses.

E. W. STAFFORD,

Government House,
Sydney, April 6, 1868.

I DESIRE to return my warm thanks for the expression of sympathy which these Addresses contain.

Through the merciful interposition of Providence, the injury I received was but slight, and I believe no further evil consequences are to be anticipated from the wound. It has, however, been considered that I shall be unequal to any great exertion for some time, and therefore decided that it would be most advisable for me to return home direct. It is a great disappointment for me not to be able to visit New Zealand, and I am afraid it will also very much disappoint the people there.

The cowardly act of one individual has not in any degree, shaken my confidence in the loyalty of the people of these Colonies towards the throne and person of Her Majesty, or in their affection for myself; and I shall gladly convey to the Queen the universal expression of horror and indignation which the attempt to assassinate me has called forth from Her Majesty's faithful subjects in Australia and New Zealand.

To the Legislative Councillors of the Colony of New Zealand, and the

Members elected to serve in the House of Representatives of the said Colony, summoned and called to a meeting of the General Assembly of the said Colony, at the City of Wellington, on the twenty-third day of the month of June, to have been commenced and held, and to every of you—GREETING:

A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS the Meeting of the General Assembly stands prorogued to the Twenty-third day of June instant, nevertheless for certain causes and considerations I thought fit further to prorogue the same to THURSDAY, the NINTH day of the month of July next, so that neither of you on the said Twenty-third day of June instant, at the City of Wellington, are constrained to appear: Commanding and by the tenor of these presents enjoining you, and each of you, and all others in this behalf interested, that on THURSDAY, the NINTH day of the Month of JULY next, at the City of Wellington, aforesaid, personally you be and appear for the DESPATCH OF BUSINESS, there to take into consideration the state and welfare of the said Colony of New Zealand, and therein to do as may seem necessary.

Given under the hand of His Excellency ~~SIR GEORGE~~ FERGUSON BOWEN, Knight Grand Cross of the Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same; and issued at Wellington, under the Seal of the said Colony, this Ninth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-eight.
