passed intituled "An Act to authorize
the Superintendent to issue Land Scrip
to satisfy awards of Commissioners un-
der Act, Session II. No. 12, of the Pro-
vincial Council": AND WHEREAS the
said Act was presented to me for the As-
sent of His Excellency the Governor of
New Zealand on the third day of June
last, and was then reserved by me for His
Excellency's Assent or disallowance:
AND WHEREAS His Excellency has been
pleased to Assent to the said Act, *Now*
therefore I, the said ISAAC EARL FEAT-
HERSTON, Superintendent of the Pro-
vince of Wellington aforesaid, do hereby
proclaim that His Excellency Colonel

THOMAS GORE-BROWNE; the Governor of
New Zealand, has Assented to the said

WHEREAS in the Fifth Session of
the Provincial Council held in the

twentieth Year of the Reign of Her Majesty Queen Victoria, an Act was passed intituled "An Act to extend the time for adjudication on certain Claims of Land." AND WHEREAS the said Act was presented to me for the Assent of His Excellency the Governor of New Zealand, on the Third day of June last, and was then reserved by me for His Excellency's Assent or disallowance: AND WHEREAS His Excellency has been pleased to Assent to the said Act. Now, therefore, I, the said ISAAC EARL FEATHERSTON, Superintendent of the Province of Wellington aforesaid, do hereby Proclaim that His Excellency Colonel THOMAS GORE BROWNE, the Governor of New Zealand, has assented to the said Act, and that I received the signification of His Excellency's assent on the twenty-second day of July, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-seven.

PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Colonel THOMAS GORE BROWNE, Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor of the Colony of New Zealand, &c., &c., &c..

WHEREAS by an Ordinance enacted by the Lieutenant-Governor of New Zealand, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, Sess. 6, No. 1, intituled "An Ordinance to empower the Governor of New Zealand to regulate the Importation and Sale of Arms, Gunpowder, and other Warlike Stores," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for his Excellency the Governor from time to time, by proclamation, to prohibit, and also to make provision for regulating and restricting throughout the Colony of New Zealand the importation or sale, or both the importation and sale, of arms, gunpowder, and other warlike stores: And whereas it is expedient that the several regulations now in force in different parts of the said Colony should be superseded, and other provisions to be in force throughout the said Colony substituted for the same:

Now, therefore, I, the Governor, in exercise of the power vested in me in that behalf, do hereby prohibit throughout the said Colony the importation and sale of arms, gunpowder, and other warlike stores, except in conformity with the regulations and restrictions following, that is to say:—

1. On and after the days on which this proclamation shall come into operation as hereinafter provided, no person shall import into or land in the said Colony, or shall sell, or otherwise dispose of therein, any arms, gunpowder, or other warlike stores, without having first obtained a license, for the purpose from the Governor, or some person authorised by him to grant the same as hereinafter provided. Every warrant of appointment to grant such licenses may contain such restrictions and conditions as the Governor may think fit.

Arms, &c.

2. If there do not appear to be any sufficient objection, a license specially applicable to each particular case will be granted by the Governor or other person authorised to grant such licenses, for the importation, landing, sale, or disposal of any arms, and other warlike stores, not hereinafter specifically mentioned, subject to such terms and conditions as may be prescribed in such license. A fee of 2s. 6d. will be charged for each license for the importation, landing, sale, or disposal of any arms,

GUNPOWDER, SHOT, & PERCUSSION CAPS.

3. Persons will from time to time be appointed by the Governor, at convenient places throughout the Colony with authority to grant general licenses (to the effect of the Form A. in the Schedule hereunto annexed) to import, land, sell, and dispose of gunpowder, shot fit for sporting purposes, and percussion caps. A fee of £2 will be charged for every such license, and the same will continue in force for twelve calendar months from the date thereof.

4. Provided always that it shall be lawful for the Governor, or any person authorized by him in that behalf, at any time to revoke any such license, by notice to that effect to be left at the usual, or last known place of abode or business of the licensee in the Colony, and in such case the amount received for the license so revoked shall be returned to the person who paid the same.

5. Special licenses may be granted by any person authorized to grant a general license on payment of a fee of 5s., authorizing one importation, landing, sale,

or other, disposal to be particularly described in every such license.

6. Every person to whom any such license shall be granted, shall on the 1st days of January, April, July, and October, or within fifteen days after every such day, make a return, in writing, to some one of the persons who shall have been empowered to grant general licenses as aforesaid stating the particulars in respect of all the gunpowder, shot, and percussion caps sold or disposed of by such person during the three calendar months immediately proceeding such days respectively, according to the Form B. in the Schedule hereunto annexed, and every license holder who shall neglect to make such return, or who shall wilfully make a false return, shall in addition to any penalties he may incur for want of compliance with the terms of this proclamation, be deemed to have forfeited his license, which shall thenceforth be null and void; and no license shall be again granted to him without the special authority of the Governor first obtained.

ARMS AND AMMUNITION FOR PERSONAL DEFENCE, &c.

7. Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall prevent any person coming into the Colony from landing such arms and ammunition as he may carry for personal defence, or for purposes of sporting, or shall apply to the importation and landing of supplies for the use of Her Majesty's Land or Sea Forces.

HALF PENALTIES TO PERSONS PROCURING CONVICTIONS.

8. And I do hereby Proclaim and declare, that for the more effectually detecting and preventing the unlawful importation, landing, sale, and disposal of arms, gunpowder, and other warlike stores, I will cause to be awarded to any person or persons who shall have been active in or towards the procuring of any conviction under the provisions of the said recited Ordinance, one half of the penalty which may be recovered by virtue thereof.

9. This Proclamation shall come into force in the Provinces of Auckland and New Plymouth on the first day of August next, and in the other four Provinces of the Colony, on the first day of October next.

FORM A.

License to Import and Sell.

Pursuant to the authority vested in me in that behalf by the Governor of New Zealand, I, A.B., do hereby LICENSE C.D., (he having paid the sum of £2.) to Import, Land, Sell, and Dispose of Gunpowder, Shot fit for sporting purposes, and Percussion Caps, during twelve calendar months from the date hereof. Provided always that this License may be revoked by the Governor, or any person authorised by him in that behalf, by notice to that effect, to be left at the usual or last known place of abode or business of the licensee, and in such case the fee paid for the license, and in such case the fee paid for the license so revoked will be returned.

The above license is granted, subject to the following conditions, viz.—

NOTE.—A return in the Form prescribed by the Proclamation of the twenty-fifth day of June, 1857, must be made to some person authorized to grant Licenses on the first days of January, April, July, and October, or within fifteen days of every such day, or this License will be void, and penalties incurred under the "Arms Importation Ordinance." A copy of the Form in which the return is to be made is printed at the back of this License.

* * * This Proclamation does not affect the provisions of the "Arms Ordinance," Sess. 7, No. 18. Under that Ordinance, the following Licenses will still be required, (the Governor having no power under its provisions to dispense with them) viz:—

1. A License from a Justice of the Peace to authorize the removal of any Arms, or Warlike Stores, or Gunpowder exceeding the weight of two pounds, from one part of the Colony to another.

2. A License to make, construct, amend, or repair any Arms, Gunpowder, or other Warlike Stores.

Colonial Secretary's Office,
Auckland, July 6th., 1857.

SIR —

Referring to the Financial Resolution passed by the General Assembly, in its

last Session, which if carried into effect by the aid of the Imperial Government, would make the Land Fund Provincial Revenue, and especially to the 17th of those Resolutions, I have to inform your Honor that, in a Despatch from the Secretary of State for the Colonies, dated the 28th February last, Mr. Labouchere expresses himself to the following effect—

“I have no expectation that Her Majesty's Government will entertain and recommend to Parliament the proposal to guarantee a Loan of £500,000, to the Colonial Government.”

“It was only under very special circumstances, as pointed out in his Despatches of 4th July 1855, that my predecessor, Lord John Russell, felt himself warranted in suggesting an arrangement for the settlement of the New Zealand Company's debt by means of a Loan, not exceeding £200,000, to be guaranteed by the Imperial Treasury, on the conditions then specified.”

“No grounds whatever have been stated, which would justify an extension of the guarantee proposed by Lord John Russell, to the further loans which the New Zealand Legislature desire to contract, and no arrangements based upon the guarantee for £500,000 thus proposed can therefore be carried into effect.”

“It would seem from the 15th of the Resolutions passed on the 2nd July last, that it is the proposal of the House of Representatives, that the arrangements detailed in these Resolutions, should take effect in and from the 1st July, 1856. At the same time it is proposed by the 16th Resolution that this arrangement should be effectuated by an Act of Parliament, for which application is made. I am, therefore, unable distinctly to understand the operation of these Resolutions taken together, which probably Mr. Sewell will be able to explain. But I cannot suppose, that it was intended by a simple Resolution of the House of Representatives to set aside the express provisions of enactments of the Imperial Parliament, and I assume, that no Acts will have been done in pursuance of that Resolution, until it should be ascertained that they were conformable to law.”

Mr. Labouchere also intimates that the Imperial Government would not come to a positive conclusion until they had the benefit of the information possessed by Mr. Sewell, (not then arrived) with respect to the questions submitted for their decision.

I have to add that Mr. Sewell arrived

in England on the 12th April, consequently, although no communication from him has yet been received by the Government of New Zealand, further information on the subject of the Financial Resolutions may soon be expected.

SECOND ANNUAL REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE WANGANUI COMMON SCHOOL, TO THE MEMBERS OF THE ASSOCIATION.

GENTLEMEN,—

The Committee elected by you at your Annual Meeting on the 1st May, 1856, for the ensuing year, having re-

signed their trust to a public Meeting called by them, and held at the Rutland Hotel on the 25th of October last, for reasons which they then laid before the Meeting, you did us, the present Committee, the honor to elect us in their stead; and as our term of office will have expired on the first of May next, we beg to lay before you a statement of our proceedings during our Superintendence.

We are very happy to be able to inform you that although we took the management of the affairs of the School, at what was considered by some a very critical time, we have had no difficulty in sustaining the establishment.

At the time our predecessors resigned there was on hand funds to the amount of £101 6s. 4d., which with the Government equivalent, was equal to £202 12s. 8d. With this amount at our disposal, we considered ourselves warranted in re-appointing the teachers, who had had notice to leave, and also to proceed with the projected improvements.

The result has been highly satisfactory to us, and we trust will meet the approbation of the Association.

All accounts have been settled up to this date, and the balance remaining on hand is £57 8s. 9d.

The number of pupils on the Roll at present is, boys 40, girls 35, total 75.

Attending regularly, boys 38, girls 31, total 69.

Classification according to age, boys between 5 and 7,—15; girls between 5 and 7,—13;—total 28.

Boys between 7 and 10, 16; girls between 7 and 10, 10; total 26.

Boys above 10, 8; girls above 10, 13; total 21.

Attainments; boys learning to read 17, girls learning to read 16, total 33.

Boys reading with ease 22; girls reading with ease 20; total 42. Boys, writing and arithmetic 22; girls, writing and arithmetic 20; total 42.

English Grammar, Geography, and History, boys 7.

Do., do., do., girls 12;
total 19

Religious Denominations, Church of England 20.

Roman Catholics 21; Presbyterians 34; total 75; which latter fact proves how completely the System adopted has succeeded, and the general satisfaction given by the School to all the different Sects of the community.

We would now earnestly wish to impress upon the Association, and upon the Public generally, the necessity for increased support on their part, in order

To enable our Successors to meet the increasing demand for School accommodation.

Two Rotatory Swings are required in the play-ground, one for the boys and another for the girls.

A Teacher's dwelling house to be erected on the premises is also essentially necessary, that he may be in a position to exercise a proper supervision of the children as they assemble in the morning—during the dinner hour, when many of them remain in the play-ground, and after the School is dismissed,—because there are many opportunities afforded a vigilant and judicious teacher for moral training at these periods of relaxation.

A Public examination of the Pupils took place on the 23rd December last, which was well attended, and the progress made by them during the previous half-year was highly gratifying. Prizes were awarded in books to the value £2 10s. 0., and refreshments were provided for the juveniles.

We have to remark in conclusion, that on our visits to the School we always found the business well ordered, and have much pleasure in recording our great satisfaction with the services of Mr. and Mrs. George.
