PROCLAMATION.

By CHARLES WILLIAM SCHULTZE,
ESQUIRE, *Deputy Superintendent of
the Province of Wellington, in the
Islands of New Zealand.*

WHEREAS by an Act of the Second Session of the Provincial Council of Wellington, No. 6, intituled "An Act to promote the establishment of Common Schools in the Province of Wellington," it is enacted that for the purposes of the said Act it should be lawful for the Superintendent by Proclamation, to divide the Province into Districts, and from time to time to sub-divide such Districts, and to re-unite any sub-divisions; And also by Proclamation to declare that the said Act should come into operation within such district or sub-division at such time as he might appoint; And Whereas it is deemed expedient to Proclaim that portion of the Province within the boundaries hereinafter set forth to be a District for the purposes of the said Act

Now therefore I, the said Charles William Schultz, Deputy Superintendent of the said Province of Wellington, in virtue of the power and authority vested in me in this behalf, Do hereby Proclaim and declare that such portion of the said Province as is comprised within the following boundaries, shall form and constitute a

District for the purposes of the said Act, to be called "The Greytown School District," which said District shall be bounded as follows, namely:—

Towards the North partly by the Wai-o-hine River and partly by Native Land.

Towards the East by Native Land; towards the South by Morrison's Bush Road, and towards the South-West by a line running from the South-Western corner of Section, number (423) four hundred and twenty-three (in Morrison's Bush), to the South-Western corner of Section, number (91) ninety-one on the Wai-o-hine River.

And also that the said Act shall come into operation within such District on Monday, the Twenty-fourth day of June, instant.
