*Diseased Cattle Regulations—
Wellington.*

PROCLAMATION.

By His Honor ISAAC EARL FEATHERSTON,
Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Wellington, in the Islands of New Zealand.

WHEREAS, by Section Number X. of the "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," it was enacted that if at any time it should be

made to appear to the Governor that any infectious or contagious disease has broken out amongst cattle in any district of the Colony, it should be lawful for the Governor by order in Council to declare that such district was infected within the meaning of the Act, and from time to time to make such regulations for destroying diseased cattle therein, and for prohibiting the removal or transportation of cattle from one part of the Colony to another, and for preventing the further spread of such disease as to him should seem fit: AND it was by the same Act also enacted that the Governor in Council might by warrant under his hand from time to time delegate to the Superintendent of any Province within the Colony all or any of the powers vested in the Governor, or Governor in Council, by the said Act, subject to such regulations as he might think fit, and might from time to time rescind such delegation: AND WHEREAS the Governor hath, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, delegated to ISAAC EARL FEATHERSTON, Esquire, as long as he shall hold the office of Superintendent of the Province of Wellington, the several powers vested in the Governor by the second, fourth, fifth, seventh, ninth, and tenth sections of the said Act, subject to being rescinded, as in the said Act was provided, and subject to the regulations issued by the Governor in Council, on the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and to any other regulations to be from time to time duly made: AND WHEREAS by Proclamation, issued on or about the fourteenth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-three, certain places were declared infected districts within the meaning and for the purposes of the said Act:

NOW, THEREFORE, I, the said ISAAC EARL FEATHERSTON, by virtue of the powers vested in me in this behalf, do hereby proclaim and declare that after the date hereof, the Provinces of Auckland, Hawke's Bay, and Taranaki, Canterbury, Nelson, and Marlborough, shall also be deemed infected districts within the meaning and for the purposes of the above-mentioned Act, and that no cattle, after the date hereof, until further notice, shall be imported into the Province of Wellington from such districts.

Diseased Cattle Regulations— Otago.

(From the Otago Government Gazette,
20th January, 1864.)

[Re-published from Special (Otago) Gazette,
of date 18th January, current, in correction
of certain errors.]

PROCLAMATION

*Of Regulations for the Destruction of Diseased
Cattle, and for preventing the spread of
the Disease called Pleuro-pneumonia.*

By the Honorable JOHN HYDE HARRIS,
Superintendent of the Province of
Otago.

WHEREAS by virtue of the powers in me vested in that behalf, I, John Hyde Harris, Superintendent of the Province of Otago, did by Proclamation in the Government Gazette of the said Province, dated the fourteenth day of January instant, Declare to be an Infected District within the meaning of the "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," all that part of the said Province lying and being within the North Eastern District of the said Province, and bounded towards the North by Shag River, towards the East by the ocean, towards the South by the Southern boundary line of the Waikouaiti Native Reserve, thence by a direct line to Trigonometrical Station L of the Waikouaiti Survey District, thence towards the West by a direct line to Trigonometrical Station O of the Waikouaiti Survey District, thence by a line due north to the Waikouaiti River, and thence by the boundary of New Hawkesbury Hundred to the Shag River.

And Whereas, by virtue of the said powers I did by another Proclamation in the said Gazette, dated the sixteenth day of January instant, Declare to be an Infected District within the meaning of the said Act, all that part of the said Province bounded towards the north by Allen's Creek to its source, thence by a direct line to Trigonometrical Station O, Waikouaiti Survey District, thence towards the East by a direct line to Trigonometrical Station L, in the said Waikouaiti Survey District, and thence by a direct line to Brinn's Point, thence towards the South by the ocean to the mouth of the Taieri River, and thence towards the West by the Taieri River, the Waipori Lake and the Waipori River to Verter burn, thence to Allen's Creek, the starting point; Now, therefore, by virtue of the powers vested in me in that behalf, I do make publish and proclaim the following Regulations for the destruction of Diseased Cattle in the Districts by the said Proclamations declared to be Infected Districts, and for Prohibiting the

removal and transportation of Cattle out of the said Infected Districts respectively, and for preventing the further spread of the Disease called Pleuro-pneumonia.

REGULATIONS.

1. That if any Inspector appointed under the "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," for the Infected Districts above described, shall at any time have reasonable grounds to suspect that any Cattle within the Infected Districts above described are Infected with Pleuro-pneumonia, or any other Infectious Disease, it shall be his duty, and he is hereby authorised forthwith, or as soon as he conveniently can, to proceed to and enter into and upon the place whether inclosed or otherwise, where such Cattle are or are supposed by him to be and by inspecting such Cattle, or in any other manner shall satisfy himself whether such Cattle, or any of them, are infected, or may be reasonably suspected to be infected with Pleuro-pneumonia or any other infectious disease, or whether the same are free from Pleuro-pneumonia and other infectious disease.

2. That if such Inspector shall be satisfied that such Cattle or any of them are actually infected with Pleuro-pneumonia or other infectious disease, he shall forthwith give to the owner, or the person having the custody charge or possession of the said Cattle notice of which of the said Cattle he deems actually infected, and such owner or person aforesaid shall within 24 hours after such notice destroy the Cattle so deemed infected, and shall forthwith bury four feet under ground, or burn the carcasses of the Cattle so destroyed, and if the owner or person having the custody or possession of the Cattle deemed by the Inspector to be infected cannot readily be found, or if such owner or person neglect to destroy the Cattle deemed infected after the receipt of the notice aforesaid, any Inspector for the said infected Districts may seize and destroy or cause to be seized and destroyed such Cattle so deemed infected.

3. That if any owner of Cattle, or any person having the custody or charge of Cattle, shall after having received such notice as aforesaid, neglect, or refuse to destroy the same, or any of them, within twenty four hours after such notice, such owner, or person aforesaid, shall be liable to a fine, or penalty of Fifty Pounds, for every head of Cattle which he shall have neglected or refused to destroy.

4. That if any owner of Cattle which any such Inspector as aforesaid, has notified to be infected or if any person having the custody, care, or possession of any such Cattle shall after the same, or any of them, have been destroyed, neglect, or refuse to bury four feet under ground or to burn the

carcasses thereof within twenty-four hours after the destruction thereof, such owner, or person aforesaid, shall be liable to a penalty of ten pounds for every carcass which he shall neglect, or refuse to bury or burn.

5. That if any Inspector for the Infected Districts, Proclaimed as aforesaid, shall suspect that any Cattle within the said Infected Districts, are infected with Pleuro-pneumonia, or any other infectious disease, but shall not be satisfied that such Cattle are actually infected, he may, if he shall think fit, order the owner, or person having the custody, or being in possession of such Cattle, to drive, or cause to be driven, the said Cattle, to such place within the said Infected Districts, Proclaimed as aforesaid, as he may think fit, there to be kept until he shall give permission for their removal.

6. That the Inspectors of Diseased Cattle under the said Act, for the said Infected Districts proclaimed as aforesaid, shall forthwith cause to be publicly posted, or exhibited at and about all the main thoroughfares leading into the said Infected Districts proclaimed as aforesaid, notice that the said Infected Districts have been so Proclaimed and Declared Infected.

7. That if any persons shall drive, or remove, or cause to be driven or removed, or assist in driving or removing any Cattle out from the said Infected Districts proclaimed as aforesaid, such person shall be liable to a fine of Fifty Pounds for every head of such Cattle so driven out from the said Infected Districts proclaimed as aforesaid.

8. That it shall be lawful for any Inspector of the said Infected Districts proclaimed as aforesaid, or any Police Constable having reasonable grounds to suspect that any Cattle are about to be driven out from the said infected Districts proclaimed as aforesaid, to seize the same and take charge thereof, until he shall be satisfied that no attempt will be made to drive such Cattle out from the said Infected Districts proclaimed as aforesaid.

9. That in case any person shall wilfully impede or obstruct any Inspector or any Police Constable acting under the authority of these Regulations, every person so offending shall and may be seized and detained by such person so acting as aforesaid, or any person or persons he may call to his assistance, until such offender or offenders can be taken before two Justice of the Peace, and shall be liable to a penalty of Fifty Pounds.

10. That all owners or persons having the custody, care, or possession of any Cattle within the said infected Districts proclaimed as aforesaid, shall within fourteen days from this day give a notice to the Officer in charge of the Police Station nearest to the place where such Cattle are kept or are, containing

the number of such Cattle, the particulars as nearly as can be of the place or places where such Cattle are kept or are, and the brands with which they are branded.

11. That the Inspector or Inspectors for the said infected Districts proclaimed as aforesaid, shall make a Report in writing to the Superintendent of the Province of all things done by him or them under these Regulations and under the said Act, as and when he or they shall be required so to do.

12. That the Inspector or Inspectors may, if he or they shall think fit, grant a Certificate to the owner of any Cattle destroyed under or by virtue of the said Act, or these Regulations recommending a grant to such owners of compensation for such destruction, but such compensation shall in no case exceed £3 per head for Cattle under two years, or £6 per head for Cattle above that age.

DISEASED CATTLE ACT, 1861.

Provincial Secretary's Office,
Dunedin, 18th January, 1864.

A SPECIAL Gazette was Published this day, containing—

A Proclamation, dated 14th January current, declaring that from and after the said 14th day of January, and until further notice, the following portion of the Province shall be deemed an Infected District within the meaning, and for the purposes of the said "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," that is to say, all that area situate in the North Eastern District of the Province of Otago, bounded towards the North, by Shag River; towards the East, by the Ocean; towards the South, by the Southern boundary line of the Waikouaiti Native Reserve, thence by a direct line to Trigonometrical Station L in the said Waikouaiti Survey District; thence towards the West by a direct line to Trigonometrical Station O of the Waikouaiti Survey District; thence by a line due North to the Waikouaiti River, and thence by the boundary of New Hawkesbury Hundred to the Shag River.

And that no Cattle, from and after the date of the said Proclamation until further

notice, shall be permitted to be removed, or transported from the said Infected District.

A Proclamation dated 16th January current, declaring that from and after the said 16th day of January and until further notice, the following portion of the Province shall be deemed an Infected District within the meaning and for the purposes of the said "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," that is to say all that area bounded towards the North by Allen's Creek to its source, thence by a direct line to Trigonometrical Station O Waikouaiti Survey District, thence towards the East by a direct line to Trigonometrical Station L in the said Waikouaiti Survey District, and thence by a direct line to Brinn's Point, thence towards the South by the Ocean to the mouth of the Taieri River, and thence towards the West by the Taieri River to the Waipori Lake and the Waipori River to Verter Burn, thence to Allen's Creek, the starting point.

And that no Cattle from and after the date of the said Proclamation until further notice, shall be permitted to be removed or transported from the said Infected District.

A Proclamation dated 18th January, 1864, prohibiting the Importation of Cattle from all the Australian Ports with the exception of Gipps Land and Mornington.

A Proclamation dated the said 18th day of January, of Regulations for the destruction of diseased Cattle, and for preventing the spread of the disease called Pleuropneumonia. The said Proclamation is republished in this Gazette.

*Diseased Cattle Regulations—
Southland.*

*(From the Southland Government Gazette,
27th January, 1864.)*

PROCLAMATION

By JAMES A. R. MENZIES, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Southland.

WHEREAS His Excellency the Governor in Council has been pleased to delegate, under the "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," to the Superintendent of the Province of Southland, the several powers vested in the Governor by the 2nd, 4th, 5th, 7th, 9th, and 10th sections of the said Act, subject to the Regulations contained in the order in Council of 18th October, 1861:

And whereas by a Proclamation given under my hand, dated 10th September,

1863, it was declared that, under certain conditions specified, the Inspector of Cattle was authorised to grant certificates to land, in the Province of Southland, cattle shipped at the port of Twofold Bay, in the Colony of New South Wales:

And whereas it is expedient to alter the same:

Now, therefore, I, the said Superintendent, in virtue of the powers in me vested, do hereby revoke the said Proclamation, in so far as it relates to the port of Twofold Bay, in the Colony of New South Wales aforesaid, and I do hereby proclaim and declare that the Inspectors under the said Act shall not be authorised to grant certificates to land in the Province of Southland any cattle which shall have been shipped on or after the tenth day of February, 1864, at the port of Twofold Bay, in the Colony of New South Wales.

Given under my hand, and issued under the Public Seal of the Province of Southland, this twenty-sixth day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

PROCLAMATION

By JAMES A. R. MENZIES, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Southland.

IN Pursuance of the power in me vested, I do hereby proclaim and declare that the Waste Lands of the Crown, comprised within the boundaries hereinafter described, shall be Quarantine Grounds within the meaning of, and under the provisions of, the "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861."

The tract of land bounded on the South by the north boundary of Block I., Winton, on the West and North-west by the Railway fence and the Winton Stream; on the East by the line of the Winton Forest.

Given under my hand, and issued under the Public Seal of the Province of Southland, this twenty seventh day of January, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four.

REGULATIONS UNDER PROVISIONS OF "DISEASED CATTLE ACT, 1861."

IN Pursuance of the power in me vested, I, James A. R. Menzies, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Southland, do hereby annul the Regulations made on the 16th inst., under the provisions of the

"Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," and make and issue the following regulations for destroying diseased cattle within the Province of Southland:—

1. It shall be lawful for the Inspector of Cattle for the Province of Southland, appointed under the provisions of the "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," to muster and inspect any cattle within the said Province, with a view to satisfying himself whether any such cattle are infected with the disease called Pleuro-pneumonia, or any other infectious or contagious disease.

2. If such Inspector shall be reasonably satisfied that any such cattle so inspected by him as aforesaid, are actually infected with the said disease called Pleuro-pneumonia, or any other infectious or contagious disease, he shall forthwith give notice to that effect to the owner of such cattle, or to the person in charge thereof, and it shall be the duty of such owner or person in charge, within twenty-four hours after such notice, to destroy the same.

3. If such cattle shall not be so destroyed within twenty-four hours after such notice as aforesaid, it shall be lawful for the Inspector to cause the same to be destroyed forthwith.

4. It shall be lawful for the said Inspector to give notice to the owner, if known, of cattle so destroyed, to burn or bury the carcasses of such cattle within twelve hours after such cattle have been so destroyed.

5. Any person hindering or preventing the said Inspector from mustering or inspecting any cattle under the provisions of these Regulations, or refusing or neglecting to destroy any cattle within twenty-four hours after notice given, as provided by clause No. 2 of these Regulations, or refusing or neglecting to burn or bury such cattle, as provided by clause 4 of these Regulations, or in any way offending against these Regulations, shall forfeit and pay any sum not less than one pound, nor more than one hundred pounds.

Diseased Cattle Regulations— Hawke's Bay.

(From the Hawke's Bay Government Gazette,
6th February, 1864.)

PROCLAMATION.

By His Honor DONALD McLEAN,
Esquire, Superintendent of the
Province of Hawke's Bay, in the
Colony of New Zealand.

WHEREAS by Section No. 9, of "The Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," passed by the General Assembly of New Zealand, in Parliament assembled, it is enacted that "If at any time it shall be made to appear to the Governor that any infectious or contagious disease has broken out in any district out of the Colony, it shall be lawful for the Governor, by Order in Council, to declare that such district is infected within the meaning of this Act, and from time to time to make such regulations as to him shall seem fit for prohibiting the importation of cattle into the Colony from such district, and the landing or driving of such cattle, and for destroying cattle imported, landed, or driven contrary to such regulations." And by Section 10 of the same Act it is also enacted that "If at any time it shall be made to appear to the Governor that any infectious or contagious disease has broken out amongst cattle in any district of the Colony, it shall be lawful for the Governor, by Order in Council, to declare that such district is infected within the meaning of this Act, and from time to time to make such regulations for destroying diseased cattle therein, and for prohibiting the removal or transportation of cattle from one part of the Colony to another, and for preventing the further spread of such disease, as to him shall seem fit." And it is by the same Act also enacted that the Governor in Council may by Warrant under his hand from time to time delegate to the Superintendent of any Province within the Colony all or any of the powers vested in the Governor or Governor in Council by the said Act, subject to such regulations as he may think fit and may from time to time rescind such delegation. And whereas the Governor hath, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of New Zealand, delegated to me, Donald McLean, Esquire, so long as I shall hold the office of Superintendent of the Province of Hawke's Bay, the several powers vested in the Governor by the second, fourth, fifth, seventh, ninth, and tenth sections of the said Act, subject to being rescinded as in the said Act is provided, and subject to the regulations issued by the Governor in Council on the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and to any other regulations to be from time to time duly made.

NOW THEREFORE, I, the said Donald McLean, Esquire, by virtue of the powers vested in me in this behalf, do Hereby Proclaim and declare that, after the date hereof the several Colonies of Australia—that is to say the Colony of Victoria, the Colony of New South Wales, the Colony of Queensland, the Colony of South Australia, and the Colony of Western Australia, as well as

the Colony of Tasmania, as well as from all the ports situate in the Colony of New Zealand, and the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope, and the Islands of Great Britain and Ireland, shall be deemed to be infected districts within the meaning and for the purposes of the above-mentioned Act, and that no cattle after the date hereof, until further notice, shall be imported into the Province of Hawke's Bay from such districts: **Provided** however, that the Superintendent of the Province may allow any cattle to be landed from vessels from the Islands of Great Britain and Ireland, subject to such conditions and restrictions as he may deem expedient and the circumstances of any cases may require.

Diseased Cattle Regulations— Canterbury.

(From the Canterbury Government Gazette,
1st February, 1864.)

PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS by Proclamation dated October 30, 1862, the Province of Otago was declared to be an infected district within the meaning of the "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," and it was declared that no cattle should be imported from the said Province either by land or sea: Now, therefore, I, Samuel Bealey, Superintendent of the Province of Canterbury, by virtue of the powers vested in me in that behalf do hereby proclaim and declare the following Regulations for the destruction of diseased cattle and for preventing the introduction of cattle out of the said infected district into the Province of Canterbury.

1. If any person shall drive or remove, or cause to be driven or removed, or assist in driving or removing any cattle from the said infected district into the Province of Canterbury, such person shall be liable to a penalty of fifty pounds for every head of cattle so driven into the Province of Canterbury.

2. It shall be lawful for any Inspector of Cattle or Police Constable to destroy or cause to be destroyed any cattle which shall pass into this Province from the district of the Province of Otago.

3. If any person shall wilfully impede or obstruct any Inspector or any Police Con-

stable acting under the authority of these Regulations, every person so offending shall and may be seized and detained by such person so acting as aforesaid, or any person or persons he may call to his assistance, until such offender or offenders can be taken before two Justices of the Peace, and shall be liable to a penalty of fifty pounds.

IN pursuance of the power in me vested I do hereby proclaim and declare that from and after the day of the date hereof the District of Twofold Bay, in the Colony of New South Wales, shall be deemed to be an *Infected District* within the meaning of the "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," and that no Cattle shall be allowed to be imported from that District into the Province of Nelson.

*Diseased Cattle Regulations—
Auckland.*

PROCLAMATION.

By ROBERT GRAHAM, Esquire, Superintendent of the Province of Auckland, in the Colony of New Zealand.

WHEREAS, by the "Diseased Cattle Act, 1861," it was provided that the Governor in Council might by warrant under his hand from time to time delegate to the Superintendent of any Province within the Colony of New Zealand, all or any of the powers vested in the Governor or Governor in Council by the said Act, subject to such regulations as he might think fit, and might from time to time rescind such delegation; and whereas the said Governor hath, with the advice and consent of the Executive Council, delegated to Robert Graham, Esq., so long as he shall hold the office of Superintendent of the Province of Auckland, the several powers vested in the said Governor by the second, fourth, fifth, seventh, ninth, and tenth sections of the said Act, subject to being rescinded as in the said Act provided, and subject to the regulations issued by the Governor in Council, on the first day of October, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-one, and to any other regulations to be from time to time duly made.

Now, therefore, I, the said Robert Graham, by virtue of such powers in me vested do hereby proclaim and declare,—That after the date hereof, the several Provinces of New Zealand following, viz.:—Otago and Southland, also the Districts of Twofold Bay and Jervis Bay in Australia, shall be deemed to be, for the purposes of the above recited Act, infected districts within the meaning of the said Act, and no cattle shall be allowed to be imported from the above mentioned districts, into the Province of Auckland, until further notice; and that in case any cattle shall be imported from the said districts contrary to this Proclamation, such cattle shall be destroyed forthwith in such manner and at such places as the Superintendent may proclaim and appoint.
