WE, the Mayor and Councillors of the City of Wellington, pursuant to the powers and provisions contained in "The Municipal Corporations Act 1867," do make and ordain the following Regulations:—

No. 1.

A REGULATION to repeal a regulation prescribing certain fares and charges for hackney and borough stage carriages made under Part X., Subdivision 1, Section 48, of Schedule XIII, of said Act, and published in the Provincial Government Gazette of 24th September, 1872, No. 24, and to substitute other fares and charges in lieu thereof.

#### No. 3.

A REGULATION to amend a regulation made under Part X. of Sub-division 4, of Section 88, of Schedule XIII. of said Act, and published in the Provincial Government *Gazette*, of 24th September, 1872, No. 24:—

For the words, "Quarterly or Monthly Licenses to date from the 1st of the month in all cases," read as follows:—

"Yearly Licenses to date from the 1st October in each year.

"Quarterly Licenses to date from the 1st days of January, April, July, and October, respectively.

"Monthly Licenses to date from the 1st of the month in all cases."

#### No. 4.

A REGULATION made under the authority of Section 52, Sub-division 2, Part X. of Schedule XIII. of said Act, for appointing the several sums to be paid for Licenses for night-carts:—

"For every License for any night-cart plying for hire within the City of Wellington there shall be paid to the Town Clerk the sum of one pound (£1) annually, and such License shall be available only until the next general licensing day, which shall be on the first day of October in each year, or the first day thereafter upon which such License can be granted."

#### BUILDING REGULATIONS FOR THE CITY OF WELLINGTON.

1. These Regulations shall come into force within the City of Wellington on the 1st day of June, 1873.

2. For the purposes of these regulations the City Council shall appoint an officer, to be called the City Building Surveyor, hereinafter referred to as the Surveyor.

3. Every matter provided for in these regulations shall be subject to the inspection, superintendence, and services of the Surveyor, and there shall be charged and received by such Surveyor, on account of the Borough Fund, in respect of such inspection, superintendence, or other services, such fees as are set forth in Schedule B. to these regulations, or as shall from time to time be appointed by the Council by regulation in that behalf in lieu thereof or in addition thereto.

4. Every building already erected, or which may hereafter be erected within the City, whether such building be built upon new or upon old foundations, or upon foundations partly old and partly

new, and whether such building be an addition to any building already erected or which may hereafter be erected, shall be subject to the control and supervision of the City Council for the purposes of these regulations, and shall be erected, added to, altered, renewed, or repaired in accordance with the following provisions:—

5. Before beginning to erect any building, or to alter, add to, or renew any building already erected, or which may hereafter be erected, or to execute any other work placed under the control and supervision of the City Council for the purposes of these regulations, the owner shall submit to the City Council the plans and specifications of the proposed work for their inspection, and shall give such further particulars to the City Council as they may require, and no work placed under the control and supervision of the City Council for the purposes of these regulations shall be commenced until the Surveyor shall have given to the owner a certificate that the plans and specifications, and proposed construction thereof, are not at variance with these regulations.

6. The Surveyor may at any time give notice in writing to any person building or about to build, or causing to be built, any building affected by these regulations, that such building or part thereof as may be specified in such notice, is or will be contrary to these regulations or otherwise by reason of the construction, workmanship, or material thereof, dangerous to life or property; but no new building shall be deemed to be a new building within the meaning of these regulations where the same shall be erected at a distance at the front thereof of not less than twenty feet from any street frontage or frontages, and shall not be nearer than thirty feet from any building subject to these regulations, or the ground of an adjoining owner, provided the same shall have the whole of the roof covered with galvanized iron, or other incombustible material.

#### *Non-combustible Roofs.*

7. It shall not be lawful to cover the exterior of the roof, flat gutter, or gutters of any building, or of any erection on the roof or flat of any building hereafter to be erected, with boarding, shingles, or other combustible material, and no person shall renew the covering of all or any part of the exterior of any roof, flat, gutter, or gutters of any building, or of any erection on the roof or flat of any building otherwise than with slates, tiles, metal, or other incombustible material, notwithstanding such roof, flat, gutter, or erection, or any part thereof, may have been covered with a combustible material at the time of the coming into operation of these regulations.

#### *Chimnies.*

8. All chimney furnaces and fireplaces hereafter constructed shall be constructed of brick, stone, or cement concrete, and the chimnies shall be carried up not less than three feet above the highest adjoining ridge.

9. It shall not be lawful to erect any smokepipe or funnel leading into the outer air, composed either of metal or of any combustible material, unless special permission be granted by the City Council, the City Council hereby reserving the power of granting such permission upon such terms as they may deem to be necessary in each case.

10. The jambs of every chimney must not be less than eight and half inches wide on each side of such opening; the breast of every chimney, and the front, back, width, or partition of every flue must be at the least four inches in thickness of brick, and the joints of the work must be filled in with mortar or cement, and all the inside thereof, and also the outsides or faces thereof, must be pargetted and rendered, and no flue must be used as a smoke flue which is of less internal diameter in any section than eight and half inches.

11. No timber must be placed over any opening for supporting the breast of any chimney, but there must be an arch of brick or stone, or cement concrete, over the opening of every such chimney to support the breast thereof, and unless the arch be semicircular, an iron bar or bars must be built into the jambs at the least nine inches on each side to tie the abutments, and no timber or woodwork must be placed or laid under any chimney opening, or in any wall under any chimney opening, within eighteen inches at the least of the surface of the hearth to the fireplace of such chimney opening, and no timber or woodwork must be nearer than one inch to the opening of any chimney; neither shall it be lawful to build or insert the ends of any joists, rafters, beams, or other timbers whatsoever in any part of any chimney or flue.

12. The back of every chimney opening in any building must be at the least 8½ inches thick. The front and back hearths of every chimney must be laid and bedded wholly on brick, stone, or cement, concrete, or other incombustible materials, which must be solid for a depth of eight inches at the least below the surface of the hearth. All front hearths must extend nine inches at the least on each side of the chimney opening, and be not less than fifteen inches wide.

13. Every chimney and chimney stack must be built wholly of stone or brick, with mortar, or cement, or of Portland cement, concrete, and every such chimney and chimney stack must be built

from the foundation to the top thereof without any corbelling over whereby any part of the brickwork, stone, or cement concrete of such chimney shall overhang any lower part thereof.

14. Every chimney, shaft, or flue, hereafter built, raised, or repaired, must be carried up in brick or stonework, or cement concrete work, all round, at least four inches thick, to a height of not less than thirty-six inches above the highest part of such portion of the roof, flat, or gutter adjoining thereto, measured at the point of junction; and as to any chimney shaft (except that of a steam engine, brewery, distillery, or manufactory) the brick or stonework of such shaft or flue must not be built higher than eight feet above the slope, flat, or gutter of the roof which it adjoins, measured from the highest point of junction, unless such chimney be built of increased thickness, or be built with or bonded to another chimney shaft, or be otherwise rendered secure; and as to the chimney shaft for the boiler furnace of any steam engine, or for any brewery, distillery, or manufactory, such shaft may be erected of any height, so that it is built in such manner and of such strength and dimensions as shall be satisfactory to the Surveyor, upon special application in each case to the City Council.

15. Every oven, furnace, close fire, or forge, for the purpose of trade or manufacture, must be six inches at the least distant from any party wall, and must not be upon or within eighteen inches of any timber or woodwork, and the floor on or above which such oven, furnace, or close fire, or forge, shall be built or fixed must be formed and paved under the same, and for a distance of two feet all round the same, with stone, brick, tile, slate, or concrete, at the least two inches thick, or with other proper incombustible non-conducting materials. Every detached stove set or fixed in any building, shall be fixed subject to the requirements in this section, with the stove pipe leading into a brick, stone, or Portland cement concrete flue.

16. No chimney, shaft, jamb, breast, or flue already built, or hereafter to be built, shall be cut into for any purpose whatever without the consent of the Surveyor having been first obtained to the proposed alterations.

#### *Footings.*

17. The footings of all walls, public or private, abutting on any street line, must be built up to the surface of the ground with stone or brick set in mortar or cement, or with concrete, in such a manner as to produce solid work, and the bottom course of all footings for brick or stone walls must be at least 8½ inches wider than the walls standing thereon.

#### *Party Walls.*

18. All party walls must be built wholly of bricks set in mortar or cement, and

bonded with hoop iron, or of stone, or cement concrete, and every such wall must be carried up to the full thickness specified in Schedule A.

#### *External Walls.*

19. All external walls (unless specially exempted by these regulations) must be either of brick, stone, or cement concrete, or of timber covered with corrugated iron of not less gauge than No. 26; but no such timber and iron wall shall be erected nearer than nine inches from any boundary line other than the frontage to a street, or the property of the owner of the building; nor shall any other building be erected nearer than eighteen inches from any wall of the like construction, or built of combustible materials having such timber and iron walls.

20. Whenever it may become necessary to enter upon the premises of any adjoining owner or occupier, for the purpose of effecting repairs to any external wall or portion of any building, it shall be lawful for the owner or occupier of any such building, after giving six clear days notice in writing to the owner or occupier of the adjoining premises, and depositing with the Town Clerk such sum as the Surveyor shall, by writing under his hand, certify to be necessary as security, wholly or in part, for any damage the adjoining property may sustain by reason of the execution of the repairs, to enter upon the adjoining premises, and continue a reasonable time in order to execute the necessary work. Provided that any damage the adjoining owner or occupier may sustain in consequence thereof, shall be assessed by the Surveyor, and made good or compensated for by the owner or occupier so repairing; and such compensation shall be defrayed wholly, or in part, as the case may be, out of the moneys deposited with the Town Clerk as security for such damages; and in case the amount so deposited shall be insufficient to meet the whole damage sustained, the balance shall be recovered by the party sustaining damage; or if the amount deposited shall exceed the actual damage, then the balance shall be refunded to the depositor.

21. The external walls of any building hereafter erected, may be furnished with projecting eaves, instead of a parapet: provided that such external walls be distant at least fifteen feet from any boundary line, and shall, in all respects, excepting as to foundations adjoining footpaths, be exempt from these regulations.

#### *Projections.*

22. Projections from buildings such as base course piers, columns, pilasters, door and window dressings, dressing strings, fascias, copings, parapets, blocking courses, plinths, or other architectural decorations, forming part of an external wall, shall not project beyond the street line, except cornices, entablatures, or

pediments, which may project any distance approved by the Surveyor, provided any such cornice be not less than twelve feet from the crown mould to the foot way, and all projections of every character must be built of the same materials as are by these regulations directed to be used for building external walls, and it shall not be lawful to project any other part of a building beyond the street line than those parts above allowed.

#### *Division of Buildings.*

23. If any building be hereafter erected with separate entrances, or separate staircases, or if such building shall be hereafter converted, used, or occupied as two or more separate buildings, each having a separate entrance or staircase, then every such building shall be deemed to be two or more separate houses, and such separate houses must be divided from each other by a party wall as set forth in Schedule A to these regulations.

#### *Privies.*

24. A privy shall not be deemed to be a new building within the meaning of these regulations.

25. No cesspool to any privy already constructed, or hereafter to be constructed, shall be sunk or maintained at a less distance than nine feet from the land of any adjoining owner, and every such cesspool must be lined with brickwork, and cemented so as to render it thoroughly watertight.

#### *Heights.*

26. The height of any building, or of any part thereof, is to be ascertained by measuring from the surface of the lowest floor up to the top of the wall plate for receiving the roof.

#### *Openings.*

27. In all external walls, besides all requisite openings for doors and windows, recesses may be formed so that the back thereof be of the thickness of  $8\frac{1}{2}$  inches at the least, and so that the sufficiency and stability of the wall be not, in the opinion of the Surveyor, injuriously affected by making such recesses.

#### *Parapets.*

28. Every external wall and party wall hereafter built of bricks, stone, or cement concrete, must be carried up and remain eighteen inches at least above the highest part of the adjacent gutter, and the thickness of any external wall or party wall so carried up above the level of the gutter, and forming a parapet, must be at the least  $8\frac{1}{2}$  inches; and should any external wall or party wall be finished with a gable, the same shall be carried up at least  $8\frac{1}{2}$  inches thick, fifteen inches above the roof at least, measured at right angles to the back of the rafter.

#### *Walls.*

29. Any wall less than thirteen inches thick, carrying a roof with principals, or extending for a greater distance than twenty feet without being tied in with a return wall of brick, stone, or cement concrete, or with a framed stud partition, must be strengthened with piers having at least four inches projection by nine inches wide, and not exceeding twelve feet apart. Any third storey enclosed by a wall less than thirteen inches thick must not exceed ten feet in height.

30. No part of any external or internal wall, or partition not constructed as a party wall, shall be nearer to any stove, grate, or other apparatus for containing fire, than at a distance of eighteen inches therefrom. Any wall or partition which, in the opinion of the Surveyor, shall require protection from fire in consequence of such apparatus, stove pipe, or flue, shall be protected in such manner, to such extent, and with such material as he shall, in writing, require.

31. The external walls of every new building erected for the purpose of containing, or containing any fire place, or furnace, to be used in the working of any engine by steam (although such engine may not be used therein), or in any mill, brewery, bakehouse, gasworks, or in any manufactory whatever, shall be constructed of brick, or stone, or cement concrete, of the thickness prescribed in Schedule A, and the roof covered in with iron or other incombustible material. Provided always that such building may be constructed of wood framing covered with iron, if more than ten feet from any adjoining premises. For the purposes of this provision, doors, door frames, windows, window frames, shop fronts, and mouldings, and projections of walls, shall not be deemed to be parts of the external walls or of the flat, gutter, or roof thereof.

32. Any person using, or building, or keeping for use, any furnace, and receiving from any other person notice of any building being, or being about to be erected within ten feet of such furnace, shall forthwith erect a party wall of brick, stone, or cement concrete, between such furnace and the site of such intended building. The party wall, to be erected in pursuance of Clause 32, shall be of such length and height respectively as the Surveyor shall certify, in writing, to be sufficient to protect the building from any danger by fire arising from the furnace.

33. All external walls not raised in brickwork, stone or cement concrete, and within sixty inches of any adjoining premises, must be covered with galvanized corrugated iron of not less than 26 gauge (street frontage only excepted), and have timbers of the following areas on cross section:—

34. The parapets of all external walls raised in woodwork shall be carried up a height of not less than two feet above the gutter, and covered on each side with galvanized iron.

#### *Roofs.*

35. The external parts of every turret, dormer, lantern light, or other erection on the roof or flat of any building hereafter erected, must be covered with slates, tiles, galvanized iron, metal, glass, artificial stone, or cement, except the door frames and doors, window frames and sashes, of such turrets, dormers, lantern lights, or other erections which may be made of wood.

36. If the external parts of any turret, dormer, lantern light, or other such erection in the roof or flat of such building be rebuilt, stripped, ripped, or uncovered, or under process of repairs, then every such part, except the door frames and doors, window frames and sashes of such turrets, dormers, lantern lights, or other erections, must be covered or repaired with slates, tiles, metal, glass, artificial stone, or cement, and such excepted parts may be made of wood.

37. The roofs, flats, and gutters of every building, and of any projection therefrom, must be so arranged and constructed, and so supplied with gutters and pipes as to prevent the water therefrom from dropping on to or running over any public way, and all such rain-water pipes and eaves gutters are to be made of metal.

#### *Bressummer.*

38. In buildings built of brick or stone every bressummer fixed to carry the front wall or cornice of a building must be laid upon a template or corbel of stone, wood, or iron, which template or corbel must be tailed through such wall at least two-thirds of the thickness thereof, and every bressummer must have at least four and one half inches of brick or stone work at the end thereof, and in addition to the supporting walls at the end of the bressummer every bressummer over twelve feet span must rest upon one or more sufficient intermediate piers of brick or stone, or on iron columns standing on solid stone foundations or trussed iron girders, approved by the Surveyor, may be used in lieu of any such bressummer.

#### *Bearings of Timbers.*

39. The ends of all timbers bearing upon a party wall exceeding nine inches in thickness must not be laid nearer than two inches to the centre thereof, unless such timbers are separated longitudinally from the timbers of the adjoining house

by at least four inches of brickwork, in which case they may bear upon the wall for two-thirds of its thickness. The ends of all timbers bearing upon a party wall nine inches thick must not project through the wall, but must have four inches of brickwork at the ends of the same, and all the timbers must be separated from those of the adjoining house by at least four inches of brickwork.

#### *Offices, Sheds, and Workshops.*

40. Nothing in the foregoing regulations shall prevent any shed, open on all sides, without fireplaces, furnaces, or forges, and with supports to the roof of wood, iron, or brick or stone not exceed eighteen inches diameter, and roofed with iron or slates, from being erected adjacent to any building, but if either of the sides, or part of any one or more of them be enclosed, the enclosing wall must be built of the materials and dimensions required for other buildings of the same height and similar situation no wall already erected and made use of as an enclosing wall shall be used in any way as a supporting wall without the consent of the owner and Surveyor.

41. Nothing in these regulations shall prevent any contractors' or builders' temporary offices, sheds, or workshops from being erected of wood or iron on any building site during such building operations, provided that special application be made to and permission for such purpose be granted by the City Council.

#### *Disputes.*

42. If any disputes shall arise between the Surveyor and any persons respecting the meaning or operation of any part of these regulations, the question at issue shall be referred by the Surveyor to the City Council for their adjudication, and their decision thereon shall be final.

#### *Tents.*

43. No tent of any description shall be erected or maintained within the boundaries of the City of Wellington unless with the express sanction of the City Council in writing.

#### **SCHEDULE A.**

*For determining the thickness of brick or stone walls, or walls of cement concrete.*

If the building be not more than fifteen feet high, the thickness of the external or party wall must be at least  $8\frac{1}{4}$  inches from the top of the footing to the top of the wall.

If more than fifteen feet, and not more than twenty-five feet high, the thickness of the external walls or party wall must be at least thirteen inches from the top of the footing to the underside of the topmost floor, and at the least  $8\frac{1}{4}$  inches from the underside of the topmost floor to the top of the wall.

If the building be more than twenty-five feet, and not more than forty feet high, the thickness of the external walls or party wall must be at least  $17\frac{1}{4}$  inches from the top of the footing to the underside of the floor next below the topmost floor, and at least thirteen inches from the underside of the floor next below the topmost floor to the underside of the topmost floor, and at least  $8\frac{1}{2}$  inches from thence to the top of the wall.

If the building be more than forty feet high, the thickness of the external and party walls must be at least  $21\frac{1}{2}$  inches from the top of the footing to the underside of the floor next below the topmost floor, and at least  $17\frac{1}{4}$  inches from thence to the underside of the floor, and at least thirteen inches from thence to the top of the wall.

The foregoing regulations were passed by the City Council of Wellington at a meeting of the Council, held on Monday, the 23rd day of December, 1872, and confirmed by the said Council at a meeting held on Monday, the 3rd day of February, 1873.

*Proclamation.*

By His Honor William Fitzherbert, Esquire, C.M.G., Superintendent of the Province of Wellington in the Colony of New Zealand.

WHEREAS by Section 38 of "The Protection of Animals Act, 1867"

it is enacted that the Governor may by order in Council published in the *New Zealand Gazette*, from time to time delegate to the Superintendent, or Executive of any Province or to any other person or persons within the said Colony, all or any of the powers by the said Act vested in the Governor or Governor in Council, subject to such regulations as he may think fit.

And whereas the Governor did, by Proclamation published in the *New Zealand Gazette*, dated the twelfth day of February, 1873, delegated the said powers to William Fitzherbert, Esq., Superintendent of the Province of Wellington, so long as he shall continue and remain Superintendent of the said Province, to be exercised only in the said Province.

And whereas by the 11th Section of "The Protection of Animals Act 1867," it is enacted that no game shall be hunted, shot, taken, or killed, in any part of the Colony, until the same shall have been proclaimed as open for that purpose by order in Council, in that behalf, and no game shall be hunted, shot, taken or killed, except during the months of May, June, or July, in any year; and whereas by the 4th Section of "The Protection of Animals Act, 1872," it is further enacted that so much of Section 11 of "The Protection of Animals Act, 1867," as permits game to be hunted, shot, taken, or killed, during the month of July is hereby repealed.

Now, therefore, I, William Fitzherbert, Superintendent of the Province of Wellington, do hereby proclaim and declare that game shall be open to be hunted, shot, taken, or killed within the district the boundaries whereof are defined in the Schedule hereto, during the months of

May and June, according to the above recited provisions of the said Act.

SCHEDULE.

All that piece or parcel of land bounded on the North by the Northern boundary of the Province of Wellington; on the West by the sea coast to the mouth of the Rangitikei River; on the south by the Rangitikei River to its source; and on the east by the Eastern boundary of the said Province.
