Vaccination Districts Constituted.

G. A. ARNEY, Administrator of the Government.

WHEREAS by "The Public Health Act, 1872," it is, among other things provided that the Governor may from time to time divide New Zealand, or such part thereof as he shall think fit, into convenient districts for affording increased facilities for vaccination, and from time to time to alter the boundaries of any such districts heretofore formed or hereafter to be formed: And whereas it is expedient that the districts hereinafter mentioned should be constituted under the said Act:

Now therefore, I, Sir George Alfred Arney, the Administrator of the Government of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of all powers and authorities enabling me under the hereinbefore in part recited act, do hereby constitute the several portions of the said Colony which are described in the Schedule hereto, to be districts under the said Act, for affording increased facilities for vaccination; and I do hereby also declare that each such district shall be called and known by the name set forth at the beginning of the description thereof in the said Schedule.

Given under the hand of His Excellency Sir George Alfred Arney, Knight, Administrator of the Government, in and over Her Majesty's Colony of New Zealand and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same; and issued at Wellington, this eighth day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and seventy-three.

SCHEDULE.

COUNTY OF WESTLAND.

56. GREYMOUTH DISTRICT.

Commencing at the mouth of the River Grey, thence up the southern bank of that river to its junction with the Arnold, thence up the Arnold to the northernmost point of Lake Brunner, thence in a straight line to the saddle between the sources of the Hurunui and Teremakau Rivers, thence down the River Teremakau to the sea coast.

57. WAIMEA DISTRICT.

Bounded on the North-east by the Teremakau River; on the South-east by the main range; on the South and South-west by the northern boundary of the Hokitika District; and on the North-west by the ocean beach.

58. HOKITIKA DISTRICT.

60. OKARITO DISTRICT.

Bounded on the North-east by the Wanganui River; on the South-east by the dividing range; on the South-west by the southern boundary of the County; and on the North-west by the ocean.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington,
this seventh day of May, 1873.

Present:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE ADMINISTRATOR OF
THE GOVERNMENT IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS, pursuant to the Waste Land Regulations then in force in the Province of Canterbury, Samuel Bealey, Esquire, then being the Superintendent of the said Province, by a notice dated the fifteenth

day of September, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, published in the Government "Gazette" of the said Province on the twenty-first day of September in the same year, temporarily made a reserve of a parcel of land at Hokitika, containing fifty-seven acres, more or less (numbered 451 in red), for a public common: And whereas on the first day of December, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, the Provincial Council of the said Province, by a resolution, confirmed and adopted the making of the said reserve: And whereas the the said reserve is now subject to the provisions of "The Westland Waste Lands Act, 1870," and by the said Act it is among other things enacted that reserves heretofore or thereafter to be made of Waste Lands shall be managed and administered by the Governor in Council: And it is also enacted that the specified purposes for which any such reserves shall be held may be changed, and any such reserves may be leased, mortgaged, or sold, either in whole or in part, by the Governor in Council, as therein provided: And whereas it is expedient that the purposes of such reserve should be changed, and that the same should be otherwise dealt with as herein mentioned:

Now therefore, His Excellency Sir George Alfred Arney, the Officer Administering the Government of the Colony of New Zealand, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority vested in him by the hereinbefore in part recited Act, and by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Colony, doth hereby order that the purpose for which the said reserve was originally made (hereinafter called the "original reserve") shall be changed, to the intent that the parcel of land described in the Schedule hereto shall, under the provisions of the said Act, be made a reserve for the purposes of a Public Cricket Ground, and that the residue of such original reserve shall be sold as hereinafter mentioned: Provided that before such change shall take effect, the Waste Lands Board of the County of Westland shall publish at least two calendar months' notice thereof in *The Count of Westland Gazette*:

And in further pursuance and exercise of the power and authority aforesaid, and by and with the like advice and consent as aforesaid, it is ordered that the residue of the said original reserve remaining after the creation of the so intended reserve for a public cricket ground shall be sold, and that the time, place, and conditions of such sale shall be fixed by

the said Waste Lands Board, and shall be published in *The County of Westland Gazette* at least two calendar months before such sale shall take place.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government House, at Wellington,
this twenty-first day of May, 1873.

Present :

HIS EXCELLENCY THE OFFICER ADMINISTERING
THE GOVERNMENT IN COUNCIL.

WHEREAS by "The Public Works Lands Act, 1864," it is enacted that it shall be lawful for the Governor, by Order in Council, to order that any public work to be defined in such Order shall be made, and that after the publication of such Order in the Government "Gazette," the Governor may compulsorily take and permanently hold all such lands as may be necessary for the construction of such public work under the provisions in the said Act contained :

Now, therefore, His Excellency Sir George Alfred Arney, the Officer Administering the Government of the Colony of New Zealand, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Colony, doth hereby, in pursuance and exercise of the power and authority in that behalf vested in him, order that the public work hereinafter defined shall be made; that is to say, that a Public Road shall be laid out and made over the parcel of land described by the boundaries specified in the Schedule hereto.

SCHEDULE.

Description of Land required to be taken under "The Public Works Lands Act, 1864."

All that parcel of land, containing by ad-

measurement one acre and four perches, more or less, situate in the Arahura District, being portion of Lot 26, Native Reserve No. 30, in the County of Westland, commencing at the North-east corner of the said Lot 26, thence southerly along the west boundary, 150 links; thence following a line bearing 116° magnetic, a distance of 470 links; thence following a line bearing 96° magnetic, a distance of 436 links, to east boundary; thence northerly along east boundary, 22 links, to North-east corner; and thence westerly along North boundary to the commencing point.

Regulations for the Conduct of Immigration to New Zealand, on the Nomination of Immigrants by Persons Resident therein.

ONE. The Immigration Regulations and Forms of Application may be obtained at any Post Office or Immigration Office in the Colony; but applications and payments for passages are only to be made to *Money Order* Post Offices or to the Immigration Officer at the capital town of each Province or County.

2. Any person resident in the Colony, desirous of nominating relatives or friends in Europe for passages to New Zealand, may do so by paying at any *Money Order* Post Office or to the Immigration Officers aforesaid the sum of £4 for each adult (except single women) between 50 and 12 years of age, and £2 for each child under twelve years of age. Infants under one year, free. In certain cases, bills will be taken in lieu of cash payments, and passages will be provided for persons over fifty years of age. (See clause 6.)

Widows with families are, as a rule, not eligible, and applications for passages in their behalf are only to be made to the Immigration Officers aforesaid. (See clause 6.)

3. Free passages will be granted to girls of 12 years of age and upwards accompanying their parents, and to single women between the ages of 16 and 35, provided they are able to produce proof of good character to the satisfaction of the Agent-General in London; and a gratuity of 10s. will be paid by the Agent-General to heads of families emigrating under these Regulations for every such

single woman, not being a member of the family, brought out under their protection.

4. Every adult emigrant will be required, before embarkation, to pay to the Agent-General 20s. (and children in proportion), for bedding, blankets, and mess utensils.

5. In the event of any emigrant applied for declining to emigrate, whatever money or bills may have been deposited with the Government will be returned to the applicant so soon as the Agent-General shall have apprised the Government thereof; but in the event of any emigrant applied for accepting the offer of a passage in a particular ship, and then, by failing to present himself for embarkation at the time and port appointed by the Agent-General for the sailing of such ship, be left behind, the passage money will be forfeited.

6. The Immigration Officer at the capital town in each Province or County (and he only) will receive applications as under:—

(1.) From persons who may wish to give bills for the passage money of their relatives or friends, instead of paying cash, as provided for in clause 1. The amount of the bills to be taken will be 50 per cent. over the amount above fixed to be paid in cash, and the bills will become due 30 days after the arrival of the immigrants sent for, and may be paid by instalments, the terms and periods of which must be arranged with the Immigration Officer.

(2.) From persons whose friends are over 50 years of age.

(3.) From persons whose friends are widows with children.

7. The above rates being only for the passage from the port of embarkation to the Colony, the cost of conveyance to such port, and to the residence of their friends after arrival in the Colony, must be defrayed by the emigrants themselves.

8. All the ships employed in this service will be under the provisions of the Passenger Act.

9. It is to be distinctly understood that, notwithstanding applications may have been granted at Money Order Post Offices, the Immigration Officers aforesaid are empowered to object to any of the emigrants so nominated being sent out, either from unsuitability of occupation or from any other cause; and the Agent-General in London will have power to refuse passages where the intending emigrants are in ill-health, or in any way unfitted,

according to his judgment, to undertake the voyage.

Regulations for the Payment of Bonuses for Nominated Immigrants.

Immigration Office,
Wellington, April 21, 1873.

THE Government having decided upon allowing bonuses to persons obtaining nominations of Emigrants to this Colony, the following regulations are issued for general information:—

1. The bonus is fixed at five shillings for males, and ten shillings for females, per statute adult, payable upon the arrival of Emigrants nominated.

2. Persons obtaining nominations must accompany the applicants to, or lodge the application at the nearest Immigration Office, where the application and arrangement for passage money will be duly made in accordance with the regulations ("New Zealand Gazette, 12th December, 1872).

3. The person introducing the applicant will then be entitled to receive from the Immigration Officer a certificate to the effect that he has obtained the nomination of A, B, or C, from to

4. A duplicate of this certificate will be forwarded to this Office, and, upon due notice of the arrival of the emigrants nominated, the amount of bonus payable will be forthwith remitted to the Immigration Officer for payment to the person holding such certificate.

Notice to Persons concerned in the Management of Joint Stock Companies.

Treasury,
Wellington, May 5, 1873.

THE attention of persons concerned in the management of Joint Stock Companies is called to those provisions of "The Joint Stock Companies Act, 1860," which require that notices of proceedings in certain cases be given to the Registrars of Joint Stock Companies, and to the penalties incurred by neglect.

Sec. 18 of the Act provides that an annual list of shareholders shall be

prepared on a specified day, containing a summary of the particulars mentioned in the section referred to, and according to the form given in Schedule E. This list and summary are to be completed and forwarded to the Registrar, and in default,

Sec. 19 prescribes a penalty not exceeding £5, for every day during which the default continues.

Sec. 76 provides that a copy of an order of Court winding up a Company shall forthwith be reported to the Registrar.

Sec. 103 requires that orders of Court for dissolution of Companies shall be reported by the Official Liquidators to the Registrar.

Sec. 109 (sub-sec. 11) provides that where a Company is wound up voluntarily, the Liquidators shall make a return to the Registrar of the resolution there mentioned. And

Sec. 123 prescribes a penalty on Liquidators not reporting dissolution of Companies to the Registrar, not exceeding £5 for every day they are in default.

Other notices are required to be given to

Registrars by the above-mentioned Act, of which may be mentioned—

Notices as to situation or change of the registered office of the Company. (Secs. 34 and 35).

Notices of special resolutions altering the regulations of the Company. (Sec. 41).

Notices of increase of capital. (Sec. 43).

And for breach of these provisions, pecuniary penalties are prescribed in each case.
